ISLE OF PINES IS REPORTED WIPED OUT

WASHINGTON, Oct. 23.—The navy department has been informed that the light cruiser, the U.S.S. Albatross, en route to the Isle of Pines, bearing relief supplies and physicians to aid in caring for the hurricane casualties, in a message from Havana, said the island had been wiped out by the hurricane and that many Americans were killed or injured. He reported urgent need there for medical supplies, physicians, and food, and requested that assistance be dispatched by aeroplane if possible.
