## 3 CHURCHES HEAR REPORTS ON WORK OF YEAR

German, Waterloo and Victoria Street Baptist Congregations' Annual Sessions

### PROPOSED CHANGE AT FIRST NAMED

Full Time Director of Religious Education There Is Proposed

A recommendation from the Sunday school that the church employ a full time director of religious education who would be an ordained man and act also as assistant pastor, was considered at the annual meeting of the German street Baptist church last evening and a special committee consisting of the pastor, Rev. Dr. S. S. Poole, and the deacons of the church, was appointed to give this recommendation consideration.

If the project receives approval it is hoped to have the new director enter on his duties in the fall. These duties will include looking after the boys' work and the training of the young people of the church for leadership.

The meeting heard with much satisfaction that the record every member canvass had brought an improved financial standing with substantially larger pledges for the current and denominational funds.

### EXCELLENT REPORTS

Dr. Poole presided. Excellent reports were presented by every department. The finance committee reported about \$18,000 raised during the year with a small balance on hand and showed that the liabilities had been reduced and the financial situation much improved.

The building committee reported extensive repairs costing \$1,600 had been made to the north side of the roof where new copper was put on. Minor repairs were also done and the church was reported in good condition.

On motion it was agreed to have reports of the intervening events read at each of the monthly conference meetings of the church.

The clerk reported a total of 855 members of whom 566 were resident. During the year there had been a gain of 21, as 53 had been received into membership, nine had been dismissed and three had died.

The deacons reported that attendance at services and attendance of communicants had been the highest in the history of the church.

### WILLING WORKERS

The Willing Workers had raised \$888.21 which had been used for missionary work in India and Canada, contributions being given to the Grenfell Mission, aid to the church at McAdam and an organ and bible to the church at Minto. Christmas gifts were presented to the Free Kindergarten. The society had passed a resolution to erect a memorial in the church to the boys from the congregation who slept in soldiers graves in a far country.

The Sunday school report showed an enrollment of 100, with an average attendance of 301 and the record in point of high attendance achieved on Dec. 12 with 380 present. The combined contributions for all purposes amounted to considerably more than \$1,000 and more than \$300 was given to missions.

The choir committee reported that the choir had been enlarged. Special mention was made of the exceptionally fine music rendered at Christmas. Dr. Harry C. Dunlop was appointed organist and choir leader during the year and the congregation was said to be much indebted to the choir for its splendid work.

### WATERLOO STREET



## CHAPLIN PROPERTY HANDS RECEIVERS

Court Acts Pending Outcome of Divorce Suit Brought by Wife

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Jan. 11.—Superior Judge Walton J. Wood, late today appointed two receivers to handle the properties of Charles Spencer Chaplin, pending the outcome of the divorce suit brought by his estranged wife, Lita Grey Chaplin. The receivers, appointed on the petition of Mrs. Chaplin, are W. I. Gilbert and Herman Spitzell. Each was required to post \$200,000 bond.

Mrs. Chaplin also was placed under bond in the action for a receivership, but for only \$100,000. This, as well as bonds of the two receivers was posted at once.

Mrs. Chaplin, Chaplin's counsel, said the public could "rest assured" that his client would fight every charge contained in the divorce complaint.

## TRUE BILLS FOUND IN TWO CHARGES

No Bill in Burglary Case of Seymour Chase—Liquor Theft Probed

FREDERICTON, Jan. 11.—Before Judge Ship in the York County Court this afternoon, the grand jury brought in no bill in the case of the King vs. Seymour Chase, and true bills in the case of the King vs. William Fairley and the King vs. Norman Fletcher.

In the case of the King vs. Seymour Chase, the accused, a Fredericton man, was charged with burglary at the Quality in Queen street.

The accused in each of the other cases is charged with theft of 22 cases of wine and liquors from the C. N. R. at McElvaine Junction, while the liquor was in transit to the N. B. Liquor Commission in this city. They belong to McGivney.

## BRUCE HINTS AT ABROGATION OF TRADE PACT

Says Canada Must Pay More or Treaty Will Lapse

VANCOUVER, B. C., Jan. 11.—Canada must buy more Australian goods, or the preferential trade treaty with Australia, also known as the Bruce pact, cannot be continued, said Premier Stanley M. Bruce, of Australia, on his arrival here this morning.

"Sentiment will carry you a certain distance, but there must be a basis of good economic in trade," he remarked.

The Premier smiled as the subject of trade treaty was introduced.

### BUSINESS BARGAIN

"That seems to be a subject of increasing interest as one travels west," he remarked.

"A tariff is a business bargain and if it is considered favorable it is continued. If not, it is discarded." The treaty with Canada was brought into existence despite a good deal of opposition in Australia. Canada had long sold us newspaper in large quantities as well as other goods—motor cars and fish, and such commodities.

"Our trade with Canada, on the other hand, was small, but we wanted to start reciprocal trade treaties within the Empire. We had known how that arrangement worked in our trade relations with Britain. Making a bargain, one looks to the future and not to the past."

### POPULACE FLEES

LISBON, Portugal, Jan. 11.—The population of the city of Coimbra and smaller towns in the province of Beira today fled into the streets and fields, panic stricken by an earthquake and submarine rumblings which lasted for three seconds.

The quake was felt with special severity about Coimbra.

BANGOR, Me., Jan. 11.—Frank Bishop, also known as Frank Levesque, 31, a gas works employee, ended his life this afternoon by shooting himself in the head with a shotgun. Neighbors say that he had been drinking heavily for two or three days. He dropped into a neighbor's and said that he was going home to shoot his wife, which information was telephoned to Mrs. Levesque, who thought it was a joke.

When Levesque arrived home he demanded a shell for his shotgun, which his wife found for him. He went into another room, loaded the gun and placed the trigger, shattering his head.

There are four children, the oldest 10 years old.

Bishop was a French-Canadian and had a good reputation except for occasional drinking.
