FINCH BUDGET BALANCED BY CHAMBER VOTE

Spectacular Descent
Toward Insolvency
Checked By Vote

TIDE IS TURNED
Ends Two Years of Abortive
Efforts By Six Finance
Ministers

PARIS, April 1.—The French budget is finally balanced, after two years of efforts, in which four cabinets and six finance ministers have fallen.

The Chamber of Deputies concluded an all-night session by voting new resources sufficient to wipe out the budget deficit and establish a surplus of between thirty million and sixty million francs. This success is looked upon as assuring the continuance of the Briand ministry, for several months at least.

The vote on the combined measures was 286 to 159, a majority of 77, with 180 deputies abstaining. The Senate is expected to pass the bills promptly without essential amendments, thus

ending the first phase of France's effort to restore her finances.

The second phase will open when Parliament meets after the Easter vacation. Finance Minister Peret will then introduce measures to finance a sinking fund to take care of the interest and domestic debts.

LOTTERY AUTHORIZED.

Bills already passed by the Chamber, authorize a national lottery and provide for the receipt of voluntary contributions for this purpose. M. Peret, however, does not regard these provisions as sufficient and will probably introduce a bill for some sort of obligatory contribution, acceptable to the powerful groups of the Left.

The tide did not turn in favor of the government until Finance Minister Peret had posed the question of confidence on the clause increasing the business turnover tax. The outcome of the vote was 227 to 163. It was the first time M. Peret, as Finance Minister, had made any question a matter of confidence in the government.

ESTIMATED RECEIPTS.

The receipts from the new measures are estimated at 2,500,000,000 francs, while the budget deficit was 2,450,000,000 francs. Allowing for variations in the yield from the new measures the surplus will be somewhere between 30,000,000 and 60,000,000 francs.

Three-quarters of the new taxes are indirect. The biggest sum, 1,200,000,000 francs is provided by the increase in the tax on business turnover of wholesalers and jobbers. Alcohol is asked to furnish 225,000,000 francs, while the individual poll tax is expected to bring 570,000,000 francs.

The great number of abstentions makes it difficult to interpret the vote on the measures, but the result is none the less achieved.

BRIAND STRENGTHENED

The Briand cabinet, accordingly strengthened, is thought to be safe from attack for some time, and may be able to get through the measures to finance the sinking fund, which is depended upon to make French finances finally safe against all eventualities.

The government's success is attributed partly to Premier Briand's skill in utilizing the divisions in all the groups, and partly to the personal popularity of his Minister of Finance, M. Peret, will appear as the principal winner, since M. Briand failed with two other finance ministers to get a financial plan through the Chamber.

The petroleum monopoly project, which threatened for a moment, to upset the whole situation, was adopted in principle.

Frank Skinner

Frank Skinner, prominent King street merchant, died suddenly yesterday at Richmond, Va., where he had gone for his health. Mr. Skinner had not been in the best of health recently and several weeks ago went to Virginia with Mrs. Skinner in hope that the climate there would benefit him. Word received by friends was that his condition was improving and the news of his death comes as a surprise. It is believed that he suffered a heart attack.

Mr. Skinner was a native of London, England, and came to Saint John about 90 years ago. He entered mercantile life and for many years conducted a millinery business in King street.

He is survived by his wife, formerly Miss Helen L. Ferguson, the daughter of the late James R. Ferguson, and one

son, Dr. George Skinner, who was Rhodes scholar from Mount Allison in 1919 and graduated from Oxford two years ago. He is at present practicing medicine at Roosevelt Hospital, New York.

The remains will be brought to Saint John. The funeral will be held on Friday afternoon from his late residence, 178 Queen street.

Richard A. Humphrey

NEWPORT, Me., Mar. 31.—Richard A. Humphrey, 61, a native of Fredericton, N.B., with relatives in Fairville, N.B., is dead at his home here. He had been long in the employ of the Woolen Mills Ltd. here and was highly regarded as a citizen. He belonged to the Freemasons and is survived by his wife and two sons.

A. Weatherhead

Alexander Weatherhead died yesterday at his home in Bernersville, Kings county, where he had resided for the last 30 years. Deceased was a man about 75 years of age. He had been ill for only a short time. He leaves one brother, William, formerly a member of the Saint John police force, as well as three sisters, residing in the United States. The funeral arrangements have been made for Friday at 4 p. m. Interment will be made at Bernersville.

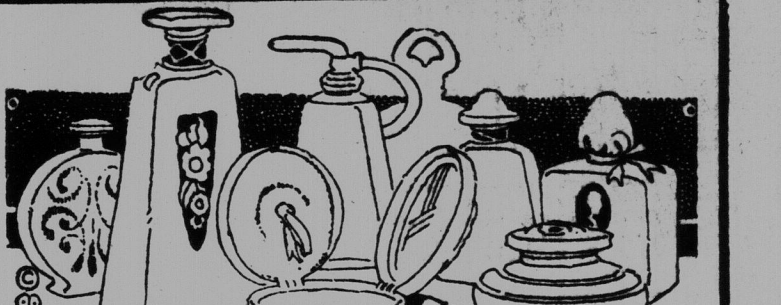

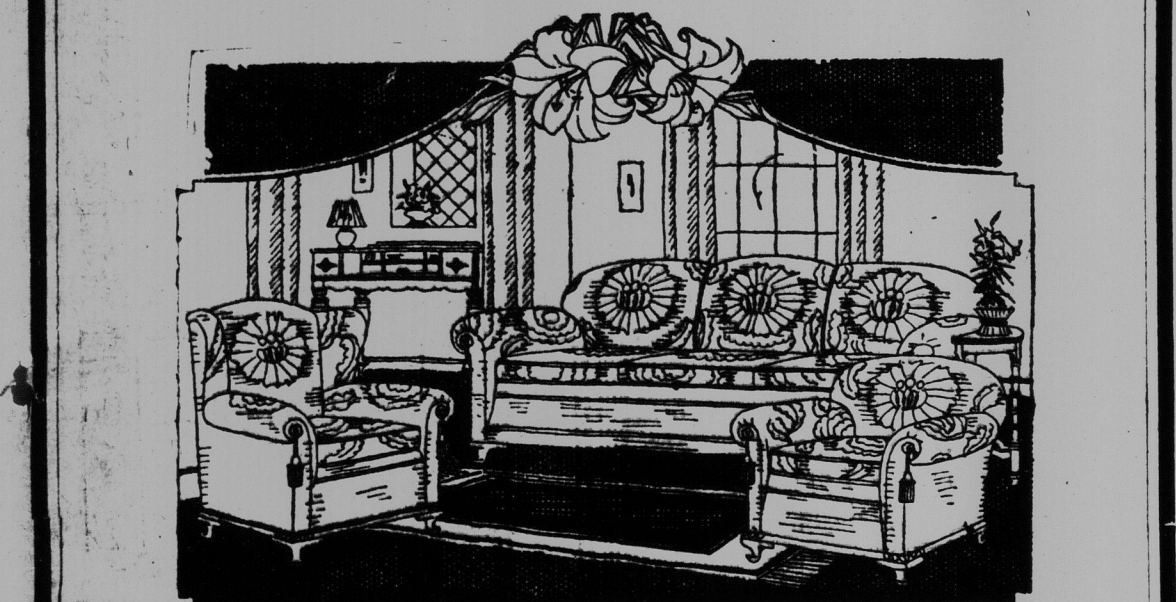
