Britain Will Scrap 5 Big Submarines

LONDON, Oct. 28.—Great Britain will economize on her navy by scrapping five of the six big class "K" submarines, the Admiralty announces. The "K-2" will remain in commission. Further economies will be achieved by abolishing the special naval resources engineer corps and the relegation of one destroyer flotilla to the reserve.

Submarines of class "K" are the largest in the British navy but for the lone specimen of Class "X" 1, which displaces 2,780 tons.

The "K" submarines range from 1,880 to 2,140 tons.

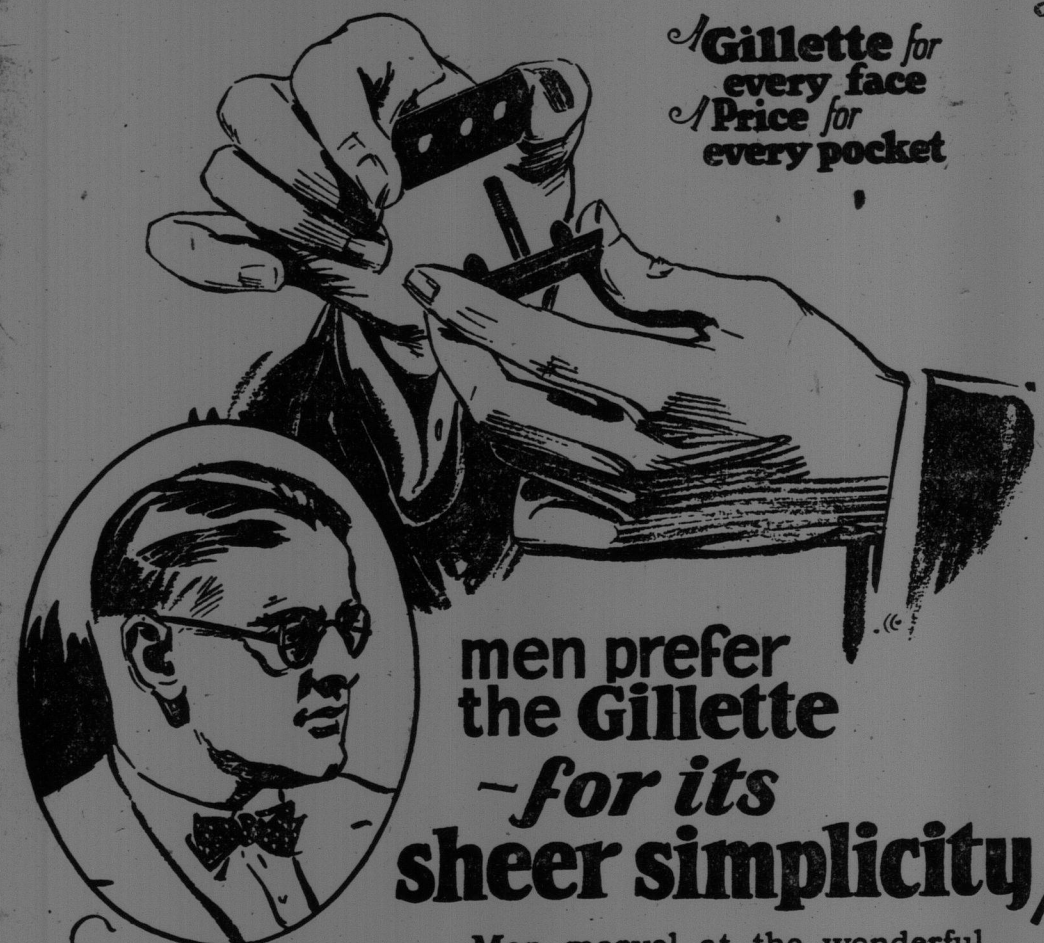
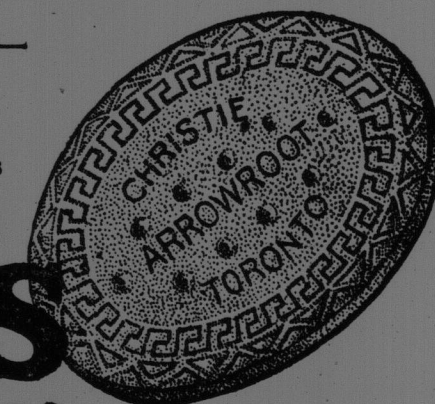

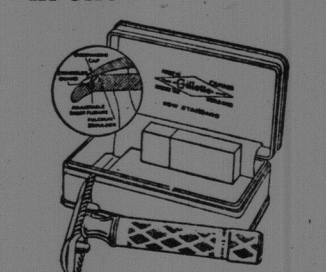
