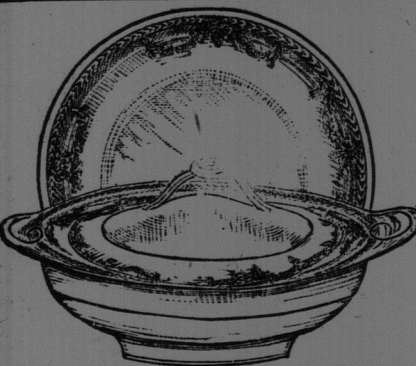

City Stables, Potato Shed and
Carleton Mill Pond Sewer
Included

Notice of motion for issue of bonds amounting to \$219,335.75 was given at a special meeting of the common council this morning. A formal resolution authorizing the issue will be passed at the first meeting held after 30 days from this date.

Of the amount \$62,734.13 is for the extension of the hydro system and \$156,601.60 is for expenditures authorized by the city council. Included in the latter amount is the sum of \$31,000 for the sewer through the Carleton Mill Pond. Other sums included are for the new city hall, the highway avenue and the frost proof potato shed. The term of the bonds runs from 5 years to 40 years and the interest rate on them all is 5 per cent.

Following will be found the particulars:

HYDRO BONDS.

Five years, \$11,131; twenty years, \$8,390.25; twenty-five years, \$85,284.04; thirty years, \$10,898; for the new city stables, forty years, \$84,406.60, for water and sewerage construction.
