THE MARY FRONTIN INQUEST ENDED

Mrs. Bessie Parker is Named in Verdict—Coroner Outlines Features of the Case.

The inquest into the death of Miss Mary Frontin was concluded last evening before Coroner H. A. Porter and the jury, after being out thirty-five minutes, brought in a verdict that she came to her death following an illegal operation performed by Mrs. Bessie Parker. Evidence was given by Dr. H. L. Abramson, Miss Margaret Merryweather, Miss Marie Kymn, Miss Katherine Frontin, R. H. Gale, Dr. V. D. Davidson, Dr. Abramson said that the uterus had been punctured twice by some sort of instrument. He said he had never known of a case of such wounds being self-inflicted but admitted that it was possible. Mrs. Parker was in court and E. S. Ritchie appeared for her. He refused to allow her to make any statement.

The jury that she was perfectly within her rights in the case and added that they should not consider her refusal as evidence against her. He then sent the jury out and they returned with the verdict as already given.

Physicians' Alliance Also Favors Consultations of 3 on Operations. Atlantic City, N. J., Oct. 17.—Consultation committees when major operations are contemplated, and the writing of prescriptions so that they may be generally understood, are two radical departures from the present practice recommended by the International Alliance of Physicians and Surgeons and National Association of Progressive Medicine at the twentieth annual convention here. 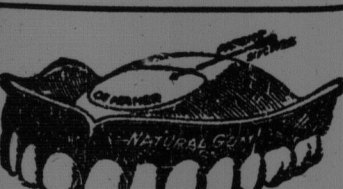

SOVIET ARMY 1,600,000; KRUPP SUPPLIES ARMS
Warsaw, Oct. 13.—(Associated Press) Russia has 1,600,000 men under arms, mainly concentrated along the western frontier from the Baltic to the Black Sea, while the Baltic States have only 120,000 men under their colors and Poland 260,000, according to figures compiled here. These figures, it is stated, have been brought out in connection with the present conference of representatives of the Baltic States and Poland at Revel, in preparation for taking part in the Moscow disarmament congress proposed by Foreign Minister Litvinov.
The newspaper Kurjer Porany declares in this connection that Russia has agreements with the Krupp works which arms and munitions are being produced on a considerable scale in their Russian works, it being reported that the factory at Tula is turning out 20,000 rifles and 30,000,000 cartridges monthly, while the establishment at Putilov is producing several hundred pieces of heavy artillery yearly.
This newspaper also asserts that the Soviet War Office is drafting selected

contingents of men between 20 and 40 years of age and devoting 34 per cent of the national revenue to army uses. There are also persistent reports in Warsaw, it adds, that Russia will turn over to German arms manufacturers all this year's surplus of the Ukrainian surplus largely produced in Russia, from materials imported from Germany.
