

SON TO FIGHT WILL OF MRS. NICHOLAS

Importer Charges Mother was Influenced by Family Virtually to Disinherit Him—Also Broke With Father.

Riverhead, N. Y., Nov. 5.—Grosvenor Nicholas, an importer of 60 Broad street, Manhattan, and a prominent member of the summer colony at Southampton, L. I., has decided to file objections to the will and codicil of his mother, Mrs. Elizabeth Teakle Nicholas of 44 Park avenue, Manhattan, who died at the Nicholas country home at Southampton, L. I., on July 29 last.

He charges that his mother was influenced by members of his family virtually to disinherit him. It is alleged that his father, George S. Nicholas, who was long the senior member of the importing firm of G. S. Nicholas & Son, Ltd., of 48 Beaver street, Manhattan, and who is eighty years old, had been unfriendly toward him for the last seven years.

connection with his father's firm in 1916 because of a family dispute. Grosvenor, who is married and has three children, declares that he was not informed by any member of his family that his mother had died and he was given no notice of the funeral service. It was only through chance, he says, that he heard of his mother's death and was able to attend the funeral. Grosvenor decided to file objections to the probate of the will and codicil at the conclusion of the examination of the subscribing witnesses to the instrument, which took place in the Suffolk County Surrogate's Court in Riverhead, this afternoon, before Surrogate Robert S. Pelletreau. His attorneys, Larkin, Rathbone & Perry of Manhattan, and Percy L. Housell of Riverhead, who is counsel for the estate, have demanded a trial by jury of the issue raised, and Surrogate Pelletreau said that he would send the case to the Supreme Court, the next term of which will be held in February, 1922.

The Surrogate allowed the attorneys for Grosvenor until next Monday to file their objections. Samuel Riker of Manhattan appears as attorney for Miss Elizabeth L. Nicholas, a daughter of the testatrix, and who is named as executrix. Mrs. Nicholas left an estate valued at about \$300,000. In the will she executed on Dec. 14, 1916, and which was witnessed by Miss August Carol Smith of 527 Riverside Drive, Manhattan, and Miss Nellie Delaney of 147 East Forty-eighth street, she makes the following disposition of the estate:

To Sara Fuller and Virginia Teakle, daughters of the testatrix, residing at 56 Franklin street, Hempstead, \$5,000 each; Grosvenor Nicholas, son, \$10,000; residuum, including the city residence at 44 Park avenue, Manhattan, equally among George S. Nicholas, Jr., son of Manhattan; Ridgely Nicholas, son of Big Horn, Wyo.; Elizabeth T. Nicholas and Virginia T. Nicholas of Manhattan and Babylon.
