TO FOIL LIQUOR FORGERS.

Permit Writing Machines Declared Solution of Problem.

Regarding the change in the method of issuing liquor withdrawal permits through the adoption of special permit-writing machines, as announced from Washington by Federal Prohibition Commissioner Haynes, a statement has been sent out from the Department of Prohibition Enforcement in which it is said:

"As last the Prohibition Enforcement Service has found a solution of the problem that promises to block liquor forgers. This is the employment of special permit-writing machines.

"These machines, while ingenious and thoroughly efficient, are small and simple in operation. They resemble a check protector and employ the most modern protective principles of the safest possible check writer. The most important feature of the machine is that the amount of liquor to be withdrawn is perforated entirely through the paper and also macerated, all in one operation."

WAR ON PROHIBITION.

French Minister of Agriculture Opens Wine Week.

(Special Cable to the N. Y. Times and Montreal Gazette.)

Paris, March 13.—With the dictum that the only way to beat drinking spirits was to drink wine, Henry Cheron, French Minister of Agriculture, this afternoon opened the French wine week campaign in the solemn surroundings of the Sorbonne.

There is going to be nothing but wine and bacchanalia about this wine celebration. At today's meeting the solemnity of the delegates and public was no less than it was in the conference hall in Washington, when Secretary Hughes rose to propose the limitation of naval armaments. On the chairman's table was a glass of water, but the audience, wine drinkers to a man, was a living confirmation of the truth of the chairman's contention that not only was wine the best preventative for alcoholism, but the best antidote to every human ailment and a sure postponer of old age.

Roundly declaring that America was mistaken about wine, because most Americans had never tasted good wine, and all those who were opposed to it had never tasted it at all, Minister Cheron proclaimed war on the prohibitionists.
