

Not more than forty per cent, of the coarse grains are seeded, and there will be a material falling off in acreage of oats and very heavy reduction in flax, Labor is reported abundant, and the wages will average about \$55, a marked mprovement on last year.

The acreage in wheat is, contain to expectations, little, if any, less than last year when the acreage seeded was a little more than sixteen million. It would seem that Manitoba is practically unchanged, Saskatchewan slightly less and Alberta increased.

The amount of re-seeding to be done in Saskatchewan after wind storms is relatively small. The supply of moisture is abundant, only three or four points reporting that they would be the better for rain. Fully ninety-five percent of the wheat crop is in good moist bed and generally well cultivated. About fifty per cent.—taking the west as a whole—of the wheat is well above ground.
