The congress opened this morning with a procession of clergy and delegates to the church for pontifical high mass sung by Bishop LeBlanc of St. John. Pontifical blessing was read in the presence of the Holy Father. Bishop Chausson preached the sermon.

The plate was developed in the air at a ready printing when the plane returned to the field.

RUSSIA DROPS PROHIBITION

Riga, Latvia, Aug. 17.—Prohibition has been abolished in Soviet Russia, and the country now is on a light wine basis.

A dispatch to the Latvian Telegraphic Agency, confirmed by the Moscow newspapers, announces the issuance of a decree permitting the manufacture and sale of beverages containing up to fourteen per cent of alcohol, which will be highly taxed.

Riga, Aug. 17.—The denationalization of real estate in Soviet Russia through a decree authorizing former owners or other persons to buy houses and land from the government is announced in a Moscow despatch to the Dosta Agency, the official Soviet news disseminator.

INCREASE IN APPLE CROPS. Ottawa, Aug. 17.—(Canadian Press.)—The commercial production of apples in Canada during 1920 was 3,404,340 barrels, according to a bulletin issued today, subject to final revision by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics.

The 1920 apple crop was 3,404,340 barrels, valued at \$29,849,140, as compared with 3,384,660 barrels, valued at \$24,996,210, in 1919, an increase of 60,680 barrels in production, and \$8,852,930 in value.

The total value of nursery fruit stock sold in Canada during 1920 amounted to \$800,092, as compared with \$270,818 in 1919.
