

PROVINCE ADDS
\$500 TO REWARD

More Clues in Sadie McAuley
Murder Case Investigated—
Report from Windsor, N. S.

Premier Foster this morning authorized the statement that the province would supplement the reward of \$500 offered by the city for the arrest and conviction of the murderer of Sadie McAuley by a like amount. The additional reward is offered on the same conditions as that by the city.

Another Suspect

Sergeant Detective Power received word last evening from the Chief of Police of Windsor, N. S., saying that he had arrested a young man answering the description of the suspected murderer of little Sadie McAuley. He is 140 pounds, is wearing ordinary clothes, is of dark complexion, has an accent in his speech and has long black hair. He is said to have been about St. John recently. Photos of the young man will be forwarded immediately and he will be detained pending identification. Sergeant Power says the description answers closely to that of the man being sought and he is anxiously awaiting the photos.

A suspect, said to closely resemble the description of the man wanted for the murder of little Sadie McAuley, was arrested in Berwick, N. S., yesterday, and is being detained in Wolfville. He protested that he was in the vicinity of Halifax at the time the crime was committed.

D. A. Morrison, chief of police of St. John, said word to the local police that a strange man, whose description tallies with that of the murderer, was seen in the vicinity of Pictou. The chief and his men traced the suspect to Pictou, where it was learned that he had taken passage on a steamer for a Prince Edward Island port. It was reported that Chief Morrison has discovered the name and address of this man in P. E. I. and has notified the authorities there.

A resident of Moncton reported to the police there on Monday that a man whom he believed to be the murderer of Sadie McAuley, had visited his house on Saturday evening and asked for something to eat. He said the man had told him that he was walking from St. John to Halifax. He said that while in the house the stranger seemed to be very nervous.

ACADIANS SEND GREETINGS TO GOV. GENERAL

Congress Opened at Church Point Today With Pontifical High Mass by Bishop LeBlanc.

Halifax, N. S., Aug. 17.—(The Acadian people, assembled in solemn national congress, with representatives from all parts of Canada, beg you to convey to His Majesty King George V. their sentiments of loyalty to him and their appreciation of your appointment as viceroy to his greatest commonwealth.)

This message was adopted at Church Point today by the assembly of over two thousand Acadians who have gathered there today, and has been forwarded to Baron Byng, governor-general of Canada.

The congress opened this morning with a procession of clergy and delegates to the church for pontifical high mass sung by Bishop LeBlanc of St. John. Pontifical blessing was read in a message from the Holy Father. Bishop Chasson preached the sermon.

Of the delegations here, two hundred arrived this morning from St. John.

The St. John delegation, the paper declares, was unfailingly to the British government, and that it is attitude was that of a great nation demanding guarantees for its safety from a small one, pointing out that the guarantees defined by Mr. Lloyd George as to be accorded Ireland were based on "the common sense of Great Britain and Ireland in the defence of their interests by land and by sea," and that for the minor guarantees demanded of Ireland she would be more than compensated by the British navy guaranteeing the protection and safety of Ireland.

"It is a bargain immensely to the advantage of Ireland which would not maintain its security in time of emergency," the paper adds.

The World, which in the past has always given particular prominence to the Sinn Féin arguments, frankly advocates the offer.

"Ireland is offered today full dominion status, at once and completely," the paper continues, "but the offer is made at a time when the British dominions have acquired greatly augmented powers and influence, and their right to voice in shaping the foreign and economic policy of the British government is undisputed."

RAILWAYS EARN LESS MONEY

C. N. R. Shows Decrease of \$240,000 and the G. T. R. \$151,000 for Week.

Toronto, Aug. 17.—The gross earnings of the Canadian National Railways for the week ending August 14, 1921, were \$2,013,368, a decrease of \$240,333 over the corresponding period of last year when the gross earnings were \$2,253,701.

From January 1 to date the gross earnings were \$63,238,426, an increase of \$4,811,098 over the same period in 1920.

Washington, Aug. 17.—A successful experiment in photography from the air, which is regarded by aviation officials as possessing possibilities of high military value, has just been conducted by the army air service. A photographer flew from Bolling field to Camp Mead and returned a few minutes later with a plate already developed showing clearly the parade of students attending the citizens' training course there. The plate was developed in the air and ready for printing when the plane returned to the field.

He made reference to the advisability of adopting some method of uniformity in the manufacture of pharmaceuticals with the Canadian formula in accordance with the national formula or any other standard.

RUSSIA DROPS PROHIBITION

Riga, Latvia, Aug. 17.—Prohibition has been abolished in Soviet Russia, and the country now is on a light wine basis. A despatch to the Latvian Telegraph Agency, confirmed by the Moscow newspapers, announces the issuance of a decree permitting the manufacture and the sale of beverages containing up to fourteen per cent. of alcohol, which will be highly taxed.

Riga, Aug. 17.—The denationalization of real estate in Soviet Russia through a decree authorizing former owners or other persons to buy houses and land from the government is announced in a Moscow despatch to the Dosta Agency, the official Soviet news disseminator.

UNEMPLOYMENT FIGHT IN B. C.

Victoria, B. C., Aug. 17.—The provincial government's effort to solve the unemployment situation in British Columbia entered into the second phase yesterday when representatives of labor, returned soldiers and the economic council conferred with the government. Many recommendations were advanced, including construction of moled towns for tuberculosis refugees, tariff reduction and ousting of Chinese labor in the mills.

Another meeting will be held in Vancouver today.
