## World Rotary Plans Golden Rule In Trade

"Boy Insurance" to Be Made Outstanding Objective in League of Nations of Business Men in Coming Year.

Public Ledger Bureau, Atlantic City, June 28.—World Rotary adopted a plan of campaign in its eleventh annual convention today to hasten the internationalization of the Golden Rule in every-day business life. With a spontaneity of enthusiasm seldom, if ever, equalled in this convention city, 4,000 delegates voted also to make "boy insurance" an outstanding objective in a league of nations of business men during the coming year in every city and town where Rotary has gained a foothold.

"Every needy boy cared for" is to be the slogan of the juvenile uplift movement. The pacifying of the world into nine divisions, each of which shall be entitled to elect one member to an augmented international board of directors, was the plan approved this morning for carrying Rotary spirit into the far corners of the universe in a great crusade for the square deal in business.

The United States will comprise six of the nine divisions, to be designated Atlantic coast, North and South, Northwestern, Middle Western, Southwestern and Mountain-Pacific. Great Britain and Ireland will comprise another; Canada, still another, and Cuba and Porto Rico a ninth section, to which ultimately will be added South America.

The new world-movement will be crystallized at the 1921 convention with the election of the new board of directors. Intense enthusiasm greeted the announcement of the formation of clubs in Shanghai, Calcutta and Buenos Aires during the year, and the prospective organization of units in Paris, Mesopotamia, Burma, Ceylon, the Straits Settlements, Australia and South Africa.

**Separate National Assemblies.**  
In adopting today a series of proposed amendments to the constitution, submitted by Edward R. Kelley of Toledo, chairman of the committee on resolutions, the convention provided that henceforth invitations from cities seeking the next ensuing meeting shall be submitted upon a prescribed form; changed the title of secretary to secretary-general; limited the term of office of secretary to two years; provided for uniform methods in dealing with the boys' work problem, and authorized the executive committee to branch offices in any country to facilitate administration and promote the interest of Rotary.

It was provided, also, at the instance of Alexander Wilkie of Scotland, and Manuel Garcia Vidal of Cuba, that arrangements be made for holding separate national assemblies at future international meetings for the consideration of matters exclusively national in scope.

The convention failed to take action upon a resolution submitted by the Rotary Club of Philadelphia, proposing that International Rotary club is logically a club of the future, and that the club should be a part of the proposed international exposition to commemorate in Philadelphia in 1926 the 100th anniversary of the founding of the American Republic.

It was explained that the project had not yet received official sanction either of the United States government or that of Philadelphia, and that premature action by outside interests several times has done much more harm than good to worthy projects.

A resolution from Indianapolis providing for the teaching of Americanism in the schools of the country was offered to the committee on resolutions, which makes its formal report tomorrow.

Thanks of the convention were tendered to Willard Lansing of Providence, R. I., chairman of the committee on revision of the constitution and by-laws.

**Canadian Emphasizes Brotherhood.**  
In a stirring address, which brought the convention to its feet with cheers, Captain Clarence A. Macdonald, president of the Halifax Presbyterian College, an ex-chaplain of the Canadian expeditionary force, emphasized the close brotherhood created by the world war between the people of Canada and the United States.

"There is in Halifax a most tender feeling for the United States, because in the hour of her distress your country showed an immense sympathy. In my city you will find a Massachusetts street, a Washington street, and a Franklin street, so that the man from the States may wonder whether he is not at home here. Speaking of loyalty, if my motto is service it seems to me our highest objective will be accomplished as we cultivate in the hearts of men this golden sentiment of loyalty."

"The world has had evidence of the splendid loyalty of the American whether he was born in the United States or in Canada. For the men of our plains and our forests to learn discipline when they looked to the colors for a magnificent crusade was no mean task. Many a Rotarian never had known the meaning of discipline. But when they came to understand that success or failure for our arms depended upon a perfection of discipline and co-ordinated action there were no more responsive men under any flag. They learned discipline and they were fighting men the equal of any of the professionally trained forces of the old countries."

"Now that the sunshine of peace is streaming upon the world, it seems to me as a Rotarian that it should be the task of Rotary to preserve that spirit of loyalty which shone so splendidly during the war."

The international touch was emphasized again when the convention arose in acknowledgment of greetings from the Rotary Club of Southampton, England.

**Making Boy Uplift Effective.**  
"This year Rotary begins to make its theories in boy insurance effective," John Dolph of Washington declared in the convention this afternoon in presenting the report upon boy uplift. "Three-fourths of the clubs in the international organization are giving this exceedingly important matter their very earnest attention. We also are co-operating to the utmost of our power with the Boy Scouts throughout the land, with the Y. M. C. A. in athletic matters, and with public school authorities."

"We are taking a helpful interest in juvenile courts, in procuring medical limbs for maimed boys, so that they may have a chance in the world, and in encouraging the establishment of night schools for boys and the reading of good books. Probably no single experiment along this line of getting to the boy and helping him to prepare himself to be a good citizen has been more notably successful than the setting aside of 'Boys' Week' in New York. This committee hopes that boys' week may become a universal observance. This committee believes Rotary should emphasize

**FIRST TIME AT WHEEL; WRECKS CAR AND DIES**  
15-Year-Old Girl Hits Tree and Piece of Glass Pierces Lung—Mother, Uncle and Chauffeur Go to Hospital.

An attempt of a fifteen-year-old girl to operate a big touring car for the first time yesterday resulted in a serious condition for her mother, uncle and chauffeur.

Directly after luncheon yesterday Mrs. Edwin C. McCullough, of 410 Riverside Drive, wife of Edwin C. McCullough, importer and exporter at 20 Broad street, decided to motor up through Westchester county.

The family car, one of the latest Packards, was brought around by the chauffeur, Pietro Rolanda, and Mrs. McCullough, her brother, Edwin, and the McCulloughs' fifteen-year-old daughter, Louise, climbed in. Throughout the drive along the suburban roads, Louise was begging for the opportunity of relating the story of the trip. Mrs. McCullough consented to her taking the wheel for a short time. All went well until the car along Pelham Parkway began. Then, it appeared, the girl began to display nervousness at the wheel. About 300 yards west of White Plains avenue, Mrs. McCullough directed her daughter to yield the wheel to Rolanda.

Just as the chauffeur was rising to make the change of seats the girl swerved the car abruptly. The heavy automobile, responding to the sudden yowl, rocked a bit and then drove for the sidewalk. Head on and with great force the car hit a stocky tree trunk.

**Glass Pierces Her Lung.**  
Held in, seemingly by the wheel, the girl kept her seat. Her mother, however, was thrown from the tonneau, through the windshield, clear over the radiator, narrowly missing the tree. Rolanda, the chauffeur, also was thrust through the jagged glass of the shield. Mr. Elze was thrown out of the side of the machine.

The sudden leap of the car and the sharp crack of the impact against the tree caught the attention of motorists and pedestrians. Before any could get to the machine, however, the girl stepped out of the car. Apparently unharmed she walked dazedly around the machine and over to where her mother lay. Then she dropped like a flash. A big chunk of glass had punctured her left lung, examination at the hospital later showed.

Miss Olga Edelman, of 972 East 122nd street, and Leo Golden of 2235 Bathgate avenue, the Bronx, were the first to reach the injured girl. A tree of Rolanda, the chauffeur, also was thrust through the jagged glass of the shield. Mr. Elze was thrown out of the side of the machine.

Excepting perhaps an imperial shrine procession, years ago, Atlantic City never saw anything more spectacular than the big parade through the business district of the 9000 Rotary men and women. It was their introduction to the city proper, for most of their time has been devoted to the allurements of the Boardwalk.

Thirty-five bands or other musical organizations were in line, headed by a company of crack infantry from the Fifty-seventh Regiment Camp Dix, and the massed National 1. International and Rotary colors, a section infinitely picturesque.

Then came state after state, the foreign delegation, Cuba and the Canal Zone making a special hit. Cincinnati, Louisville and Toronto were given resounding applause. There was an entire division of the clubs from Pennsylvania. San Diego entered a particularly beautiful float.

Glen Mead, of the Philadelphia Rotary Club, today was appointed a member of the special committee on budget. Hubert Somers, of Atlantic City, presented the report of the committee on credentials, and Harry W. Corbett, also of Atlantic City, that of the registration committee, after the convention had been opened with an invocation by Rabbi Rudolph L. Coffe, of Collingwood Avenue Temple, Toledo. Reports showed a total registration in 1920 for the United States; thirty-three clubs for Canada, out of a total of thirty-eight; four of the six clubs of
