**CET INTO THE GAME**  
The new spirit of St. John was manifest at the Get-Together dinner at Keith's assembly rooms last evening.

More than three hundred men were there, filling the tables in both rooms, and they were representatives of all interests in business and the professions. They cheered the president of the board of trade, the mayor, and Mr. Chase, who set forth with great clearness the objects to be attained by the enlarged board and the advantages to be derived by the city from an active participation of a thousand earnest men or more in the varied activities outlined in the new programme.

The meeting was at once a revelation of the new spirit of progress, and an inspiration to every man present to join with his fellows in a forward movement such as St. John has never yet seen. The speakers made a clear statement of the reasons for confidence in a great future for this city, and there was a hearty and ready response to the appeal for volunteer workers to spend a portion of today and the two following days in an effort to place the board, numerically, and financially, in a position to do its best work for the advancement of the interests of the whole city.

It is now up to the citizens. There can be no doubt at all that the appeal will meet with a hearty response, and it should be such a response as will tell to the rest of Canada that St. John recognizes its position on the front street and proposes to do a front street business.


**POLITICS AND THE FLAG**  
The manner in which politicians have exploited the flag and the sentiments of loyalty of the Canadian people is now quite apparent to everybody. It is a shameful story, and history will do full justice to those persons who were willing to subordinate the highest feelings of the people to their own selfish ends. The Montreal shareholder came up the situation in the following brief but striking paragraph: "Our sensitiveness to emotional appeal has been very highly developed, and astute politicians realizing this find it the only way to accomplish their ends is to arouse the people by some fervid appeal. Once their passions or prejudices have been aroused, people will do things which they may regret later on. We have had examples of this in Canadian political life. The recent reciprocity arrangement with the United States is a case in point. By dint of great flag-waving, fervent appeals to the loyalty of the people and denunciations of the 'Yankees,' the agreement was defeated. There are evidences today that on a second thought, the people are sorry for their verdict of September 21st, 1911. They were carried away by impulses which they now regret. Apparently, a somewhat similar campaign is now on in connection with the navy."

**WASTE OF HUMAN ENERGY**  
"One of the saddest things about life on this planet is the undeveloped waste of human powers."

This striking sentence from an address delivered in Bangor by the President of Colby College is well worth pondering over. It is a challenge to the people of every community to pay more attention than has been paid to the work of human conservation. True, there is also a systematic effort to conserve human energy, and to prevent waste, but how very far short we come of performing the task with complete success. Every child has the capability with proper education and training to become a producing factor, and an added influence in the development of a higher civilization, but how many there are of these children who are not educated and not trained, and who go through life in an apparently purposeless manner, with very little ambition other



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## KINGS COUNTY COUNCIL

At yesterday afternoon's session of the Kings County Council the petition of John L. Coleman, proprietor of the Tourist Hotel, Hampton Village, setting forth that his wife and four children had been quarantined for scarlet fever by Dr. Wetmore, chairman of the Board of Health, while three other physicians had afterwards certified that there was no trace of the disease, and praying that Dr. Wetmore be removed from his position, was received but action was deferred until this morning.

The proposal to assess \$60 for laying out a road from Passages to Salt Springs was laid over until the next meeting and petitions for and against the laying out of a road from Westfield to Public Lands, at a cost of \$100, were laid over until this morning.

Dr. F. H. Wetmore, chairman of the board of health, submitted his report, dealing with forty cases of infectious diseases during the year.

A committee reported that they had laid the petition of the council for the dismissal of Dr. Wetmore before the provincial government, but had received no answer.

W. G. Asbell, Canada Temperance Act Inspector, reported twenty-three violations of the law during the year. The sum of \$477.45 was collected in fines and costs and expenditures of \$729.10 incurred, leaving a deficit of \$251.65. He was re-appointed for 1913 at a salary of \$800.

The committee on tuberculosis reported that no action had been taken. Councilors Murray, Price and Currie were appointed a committee to visit the municipal home and report on conditions.
