JAMES RYDER IS KILLED BY STREET CAR

Captain Tufts Has Leg Broken—Struck While Crossing Main Street—Body Wedged Under Fender Half an Hour

Struck down by a rapidly moving street car in Main street between Sheriff and Simonds streets at 8 o'clock last evening, James Ryder, of 26 Sheriff street, aged 63, was almost instantly killed, and Captain Benjamin Tufts, of 123 Acadia street, was badly injured and now lies in the General Public Hospital in a serious condition. Ryder was knocked down by the fender, dragged under the car and so firmly wedged that half an hour elapsed before the car was raised and he could be extricated. The doctors found on his being taken out that his neck was broken, one of his arms and a leg broken, that he had a serious scalp wound and marks of electrocution. Captain Tufts had one leg dislocated at the ankle, bruises on his face and a general shaking-up, but is expected to recover. The car, No. 62, was in charge of John Reynolds, motorman, and Harry Smith, conductor. An inquest will be held by Dr. W. F. Roberts.

The police will have at the inquest an eye-witness of the accident, a member of the crew of one of the steamers in port, whose name is withheld for the present. This man says that he saw Ryder and Tufts, both elderly men, step off the sidewalk on the northern side of the street and start to cross to the other side. The car was coming down the hill, city bound, and he says the going was ringing as he required in making the crossings. When the men left the sidewalk a team came along and the witness says they were ahead of the team and apparently did not see the car until it was close upon them and they were on the track. One man then grasped the other by the arm and one evidently pulled one way and one the other. Becoming confused they were stricken down and as this was a very dark bit of street they had not been sighted by the motorman.

The car was stopped as soon as the motorman felt the shock of the collision, and the witness called to the crew that there was a man under the wheels. Captain Tufts had been struck by the fender and thrown clear of the car, and was found behind it. He was conscious when picked up. He was first taken to Ross' drug store and was afterwards taken to the hospital in the ambulance.

Mr. Ryder was underneath the car, and there was some doubt as to whether or not he was still alive. After some confusion, Benjamin A. Clifton took charge of the work and the car was raised with jacks, secured from Samuel Johnson, Dr. C. M. Pratt and Dr. W. F. Roberts were in attendance, and as soon as they saw the body they announced that Mr. Ryder had been instantly killed.

The body was taken to Ross' drug store and to Chamberlain's undertaking rooms. Mr. Ryder was an employee in Hilary's mill, Strait Shore, and was a well known resident of the North End.

Mr. Ryder had called for him a few minutes before the accident and they had gone out together. Mr. Ryder's pocket-book, containing \$80, was found in his pocket by the undertaker. Doctor Pratt said that Mr. Ryder had suffered from a weak heart, and that the shock alone would have been enough to have caused his death.

Another serious result of the accident is the effect it had on Mrs. Tufts, who was spending the evening with her daughter, Mrs. G. Gayton, 482 Main street, almost opposite the place where the accident occurred. She has only recently recovered from a serious illness, and when the news of the accident reached her, she was prostrated and required medical attendance.

In May, 1908, May Howe, a six-year-old girl, was killed by a street car in Carleton and at that time a coroner's jury brought in a verdict exonerating the motorman but the jury's recommendations were sent to the county secretary and have never been fully enforced.

The portion of the jury's verdict containing the recommendations follows: "In our opinion the fender was too high and we do not consider this type of fender an adequate protection."

"We strongly recommend that the management of the said company strictly enforce the rule regarding the ringing of gongs at all cross walks."

"We also recommend that the speed of all street cars be regulated by legislation and that a speed indicator be placed in all street cars."

"We further recommend that the equipment of street cars as regards alarms, brakes and fenders be regulated and controlled by government."
