Yvette Guilbert, famous French singer, will build a little theatre in the heart of the city, and will produce there her own works.

## THEIR WORKS PRODUCED THERE

Aims to Assist Unappreciated Musicians and Composers—For Eighteen Years She Has Been Collecting Old English and French Songs

Paris, Jan. 30.—Unnoticed and almost unknown to the world, Yvette Guilbert, she of the long, glowing, Titian locks and the big, heart, is building a theatre in the heart of the city, and will produce there her own works. For many years she has taken an interest in the long-haired geniuses of several professions and she now hopes to give the "great unappreciated" a chance to exhibit their abilities before an appreciative public without the interference of a cold commercial manager.

"I am going to have a little hall all my own," she said to me today. "I am tired of all the little theatres where I am only one of many. I will have a place where I can produce the works of the great unappreciated musicians which will give the works of men and women who are at present unappreciated only by the intellectual. With the profits I am sure I will make, I will build a maison d'artiste, similar to institutions to be found in almost every continental city except this. The great artists of every kind, when they visit Paris, the world's centre of art, can be fed and entertained in a proper way. Musical and literary celebrities will be held there, and it will serve as a meeting place for all who are interested in the arts."

## THE DEATH OF FRANK LOWE

An inquest into the death of Frank Lowe, who died in the jail last Sunday afternoon, took place last evening, with Coroner Berryman presiding. The jury returned a verdict of death by natural causes and personal neglect were the cause which brought about the prisoner's death. S. Clifford, the coroner, Dr. James Christie, the jail physician, and Daniel Pritch, a prisoner in the jail who was with Lowe at the time of his death, were the witnesses examined, and their evidence was merely a repetition of facts previously published.

Dr. James Christie, the jail physician, testified that when he visited Lowe in his cell on the 29th inst., he noticed that he was rather pale and somewhat nervous. His face appeared to be jaundiced and his legs were swollen. He thought him to be a broken down drunkard. On this occasion he prescribed a tonic for him and had him not showed signs of improvement within a week he planned on sending him to the hospital. He told of paying a second visit on Sunday last in response to a call, and giving an order to have the prisoner removed to the hospital. He thought his death was from over exertion due to an unbroken heart.

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# COMMISSION ON THE TARIFF

Hon. Mr. White Outlines Bill In the House of Commons

Will Be For Inquiry

Appointment of Three Members for Five Years at \$7,000 and \$7,500 a Year—New L.C.R. Division Superintendent—Montreal Harbor

Ottawa, Jan. 30.—Three able, earnest, capable men, commanding the confidence of the community and broad enough to be in sympathy with all reasonable views, were named by the minister of finance, to parliament this afternoon, concerning the personnel of the proposed tariff commission in introducing the government bill to provide for the appointment of the board. The members, the minister added, had not yet been selected.

"Very sincerely, on behalf of those on this side of the house," said Sir Wilfrid Laurier, "do I associate with my right hon. friend in the profound sympathy which at this time permeates every British subject."

At the opening of the session sympathetic reference was made by the premier and Liberal leader to the death of the Duke of Devonshire. "He was a man," said Mr. Laurier, "of distinguished ability and characteristic earnestness of purpose. I am sure my right hon. friend will join me in expressing the profound and sincere sympathy of the members of the Canadian parliament."

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
