The Bishop's Address.

While addressing you by this endearing appellation, borrowed from Apostolic usage, and adopted in all the offices of our Church, I remind myself and you of our union with the Adorable Head of the Universal Church, and of that communion and fellowship which subsists between all the members of His mystical body, wherever locally situated or in whatever position they hold in the Church of God.

It is also intended to remind us that all our resources are in Him, "from whom the whole body fitly joined together and compacted by that which every joint supplieth, according to the effectual working in the measure of every part, maketh increase of the body unto the edifying of itself in love."

With an affectionate greeting I bid you welcome in the name of the Lord to this our annual gathering, and I desire, in the very forefront of this address, to put on record my grateful sense of the manifold goodness of our God upon us.

Each Synod, as it comes and goes, leaves its distinct impress upon the Diocese, and each year of active work tells with marked effect on its strength and growth.
