. . . THE AWAKENING OF CHINA. The Missionary Review of the world

calls attention to the evidence of the awakening of China displayed by the proclamation of the victory of Fuchan, the governor of 48,000,000 Chinamen, abolishing processions in honor of idols. This is said to be the most sweeping edict of the kind ever promulgated in China, and of far greater importance than would appear to casual readers. Says The Review:

The native citizens of China at large have had to appeal more frequently throughout the country from persecution, because they could not, as Christians, contribute to the idol-worship than all other causes combined. The proclamation prohibits solicitation to all such services and processions under severe penalties. The charges made against the seekers of contributions to processions of idols in the country are downright and plain. The viceroy has not chosen to say Christians may not be required to pay idol money, but, without mentioning Christians at all, has gone thoroughly into the matter, and forbidden the holding of such services altogether. He has thereby also looked into the question of the lawfulness of such and has forbidden their being observed at all, not raising the question of their support with or without effort. Hitherto Christians have been beaten, their crops destroyed, their cattle killed, houses looted, chapels put in ruins, and the people driven away from their homes because they would not contribute to these idol services, exemption from which is secured to them by all treaties made by China with the foreign powers. Ghina is taking her place in the world as a power that carries out in good faith treaties for the protection of aliens and devotees of alien religions. This is a long step forward. OPIUM QUESTION.

W. L. Mackenzie King, M. P., the newly-elected representative of North Waterloo in the Commons, will be Canada's representative at the International Quinquennial Conference Pekin next January on the suppression of the opium traffic. Mr. King made a special investigation of the opium question in Vancouver last spring, and the bill suppressing its use in Canada was passed on his recommendation.

At the time he furnished the United States Government on request some of the facts learned during his Georgian Bay canal must be built, the Vancouver investigation, and the sugpeople whose interests will be affected by it have made their wishes ton that he be appointed Canada's representative. Sir Wilfrid Laurier also asked Mr. King to accept the mission, and the Imperial Government has concurred in his selection as Canada's representative. REGENT TAKES HOLD

Crisis Follows Death of Empress Dowager in China.

FOURTEEN BANKS TOPPLE

Runs on Native Financial Institutions Prove Disastrous - Prince Chun Take Firm Grip on Affairs to Prevent Revolutionary Demonstrations-Many Reforms Will Be Introduced In the Empire.

Pekin, Nov. 17.—China is beginning to realize that the Emperor and the Dowager Empress are dead.

The Chinese had been so accustomed to look upon the dowager as the one person dominating all, that the announcement of her death caused, but little change in their unemotional natures and easy going ways during the early hours of the ceremonies attending her passing, but to-day there has come a marked change.

Prince Chun, the regent of the empire, in fear of the increasing excitement and revolutionary movements.

pire, in fear of the increasing excitement and revolutionary movements, has taken a firm grip on affairs, and has adopted stringent measures that will result in the maintaining of peace for a time at least.

At noon yesterday 3,000 gendarmes guarded the street, and other military forces were held in readiness for an eventuality. The foreign legations are under guard, special detachments of Chinese troops keeping watch at the approaches and in some cases the regular legation guard was augmented by reinforcements from other places. Fifty Highlanders were added to the British forces.

The Chinese Government seemingly has no fear that the conditions now prevailing will be utilized for greater reforms, if precautions now taken at Pekin against a sudden insurrection can be made to over-awe the disaffected. Last night a large number of the gendarmes were withdrawn, and the streets presented a deserted appearance. The police tore the remaining shreds of color from the shops and vehicles before sundown. The people have adopted a dress of mourning, and all officers are attired in white. The buildings are draped in blue and black.

MR. N. W. ROWELL, K.C., SPEAKS AT Y. M. C. A. LUNCHEON.

Toronto, Nov. 14.—Addressing the nembers of the Y. M. C. A. at their uncheon yesterday Mr. N. W. Rowell, K.C.. explained at length the Laymen's Missionary Movement. From information obtained by a conference of missionary workers it appeared there would be required 1,600 missionary leaders from Canada.
