MANUFACTURERS ARE PROTECTED.
BY A RECENT COURT DECISION AS TO INFRINGEMENT OF REGISTERED TRADE MARK.

The case of Gillett vs. Lumden, infringement of registered trade mark, which has been just settled in the Trial Court, Osgoode Hall, Toronto, before Justice Street, is one of great importance to the grocery trade in Canada, and has attracted the attention of merchants generally for the past six months.

The facts, as found by the trial judge, are established as follows: Gillett, manufactured and sold large quantities of "Cream Yeast" under that label from 1877 down to 1885, but through their introduction of "Royal Yeast," the sale of the former was suspended for a time. They still made and sold the "Royal Yeast," and did not relinquish their right and title to the same, and kept the original labels in stock, and used them when sales of "Cream Yeast" were made. This label having been registered at Ottawa in 1877 and again in 1894. In January, 1901, the defendants began the sale of Jersey Cream Yeast, and while there was no attempt at imitation of the plaintiff's packages, in shape or otherwise, they evidently copied verbatim portions of the plaintiff's package, showing that in preparing their label they had the plaintiff's label before them.

The defendant pleaded ignorance of the existence of "Cream Yeast," but the learned judge held that Gillett & Co. had established a reputation for their yeast under the name of "Cream Yeast," had made it their property, and though they had not for some years previous to 1901, when the suit was entered, sold any great quantity, it shows the name in their right to use the name in connection with the goods, as they were at all times prepared to furnish the label "Cream Yeast" upon occasions of requirement between 1894 and 1901. Judgment was granted, declaring the defendants guilty of infringement of the plaintiff's trade mark, and that their yeast, have infringed the plaintiff's label before them.

HEALTH OFFICERS MEETING.

PROGRAMME OF THE GATHERING NEXT SEPTEMBER AT BERLIN.

The preliminary announcement has been issued of the meeting of the Executive Health Officers' Association of Ontario, which will be held in Berlin on Sept. 8 and 9. The programme of work carried on at Berlin by the Government under the Provincial Board of Health on the septic tank method of sewage disposal will be well advanced by the time of the meeting, and it is expected that the members of the association will find much that is interesting and instructive in the work being carried on. The usual reduction of rates on the railways will be given on the certificate plan. Dr. P. H. Bryce is the Secretary-Treasurer of the association. The programme provided embraces the following subjects: (1) The public water supply and methods of sewage disposal. (2) The needs for sanitary supervision in the construction and operation of workhouses and factories in Ontario. (3) Sanitation of the preparation, storage and transportation of food products. (4) The problem of municipal health work. (5) Report of special committees on vaccination. (6) Variations in type of contagious disease.

LABEL ACTIONS BY WHOLESALER.
