PRESIDENT:

HIS EXCELLENCE THE GOVERNOR GEN-

ERAL IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS it is provided by the 5th Section

of the Act 31 Victoria, Chapter 6, initiated

by an Act respecting the Customs, that the im-

porter of any cattle or swine, whether slaughtered and

cut up and pack the same in bond, under such Re-

gulations and restriction as the Governor in

Council may from time to time make for this pur-

pose, and whereas it has been found expedient re-

gards the importation of swine, to al ter the re-

gulations of the Regulations for that purpose, adopt-

ed in Council, on the recommendation of the

Minister of Customs and Excise, and the

Admiralty and Navy Board, and the said Order

in Council of the 2nd day of May, 1868, and the

Regulations thereto annexed, and that the following Regu-

lations be and are hereby adopted and establish-

ed in lieu thereof—that is to say, for the pur-

pose of slaughter, upon the usual sum of value

names, stating upon its face, the number and

value of each head, and also the quantity of meat

bacon, hams and lard, which the number and

weight of each head of swine imported, and

the amount of duty to which such produce is or

may be subject under the rate prescribed by the

tariff, or at the time being as the property is or

executed a bond to the Queen, in default of which

amount of swine, the cost of which of which

shall be, that upon the value of which the amount

one quarter of the said products of the swine so im-

ported, and converted into bacon, hams and

lard, or part of the duty secured by the said

bond, shall be and become null and

void, otherwise shall remain in full force and

virtue.

2. Upon the reception into the Bonding Ware-

house, the swine shall be regarded only as meat

from such Warehouse alive; nor shall any part

of the produce of such swine be removed, except

for the use of the Collector or proper Officer of Customs, as in the

case of all such bonded goods.

3. Such importation in such carcasses as are

placed in a Warehouse of the premises in the usual

place of curing and packing, for the

use of such carcasses to be duly satisfied

by the proper Officer of Customs and the Impor-

ter shall give bond to the Queen in double the

amount of duty, or in case of default, the

tariff then in force, conditioned for the due ex-
portation of the carcasses, or payment of duty with-
out the date of entry.

4. The killing pens, curing and packing house

and all cellular pens or other enclosures included

in such a carcass and the meat of the swine

imported in carcasses for curing and packing, at the

actual assessed weight at the entry, shall be

subject while in bond to all changes in the
