lime enjoyment; that, in linking all the powers of his mind to active and useful objects, De Montaigne was infinitely happier than the philosophy of indifference, the scorn of ambition had made Maltrevers. The influence exercised by the large souled, practical Frenchman over the fate and the history of Maltrevers, was very peculiar. He had not, apparently and directly, operated upon his outward destinies; but he had done so indirectly, by operating upon his mind. Perhaps it was he who had consolidated the first wavering and uncertain impulses of Maltrevers towards literary exertion; it was he who had consoled him for the mortifications at the early part of his career; and now, perhaps, he might serve, in the full vigor of his intellect, permanently to reconcile the Englishman to the claims of life.

There were, indeed, certain conversations which Maltrevers held with De Montaigne, the germ and pith of which it is necessary that I should place before the reader—for I write the inner as well as the outer history of a man—and the great incidents of life are not brought about only by the dramatic agencies of others, but also by our own reasonings and habits of thought. What I am now about to set down may be wearisome, but it is not episodic; and I promise that it shall be the last didactic conversation in the work.

HORSE BECOMES
A LIVING TORCHAnimal Driven by Jeremiah
O'Donnell, Electrocuted on
Jefferson Ave., Detroit.

Detroit News: Electrocuted by a live trolley wire, a horse owned and driven by Jeremiah O'Donnell, 746 Fort street east, created a startling display of fireworks on Jefferson avenue near Balvidere.

Mr. and Mrs. O'Donnell had been driving in the east end of the city and were returning home Sunday evening when the accident occurred. A trolley wire broken by a passing car was dangling over the street unguarded and menacing the lives of all in its vicinity. The wire was seen by a son of Dr. John F. Bennett, who shouted a warning to the O'Donnells as they turned across the tracks. His shout was unheard however and the horse ran directly into the hanging wire.

Immediately the animal became a living torch, the harness transmitted the current all over its body. The buckles burned with a fierce white flame making a glare of light. Flashes a foot in length shot into the air, and the entire atmosphere became charged by the stampeding current.

Mr. and Mrs. O'Donnell leaped from the rig just as the horse fell to the ground. Mrs. O'Donnell was uninjured, but her husband suffered a wrench in his shoulder and several bad bruises. O'Donnell attempted to take hold of the fallen horse but was hurried back by a bystander barely in time to save his life.
