## THE RUSSIAN REVOLUTION.

Though M. Witte is one of the most advanced of the reformers at home, when he is abroad he is a Russian and refuses to tell tales out of school. Consequently he assures the American newspapers that all these reports of Russia's internal troubles are greatly exaggerated and misinterpreted, and pooh-poohs the idea that any such thing as a revolution is possible. The impression he evidently seeks to convey is that the government has entered upon a career of reform which will end only when the people are satisfied and happy.

In interesting contradiction to this expressed opinion is an article by so eminent an observer as Dr. E. J. Dillon, written from first knowledge, and after long residence in St. Petersburg, for the August number of Review of Reviews. According to Dr. Dillon there have never been any reforms in the direction of more liberal rule, nor ever will be while the present system is in power. True, he says, the Czar has made many promises, some of them apparently explicit and precise, but none of them have been carried out, chiefly because the Czar has entrusted their execution to the bureaucracy, which that execution would annihilate, and which naturally and calmly has proceeded to smother the innovations in the germ.

Thus, he says, the Czar solemnly agreed to give his people a representative assembly, but his ministers, with his consent, refused to say when or how they would carry out this promise, and they even punished the simple-minded who took it seriously. More depressing still is the circumstance that almost every step taken by the authorities since then betokens a tendency bitterly hostile to representative government. Recently, for example, the Czar called upon his subjects to assist him with their advice, and for this purpose expressly permitted them, in his ukase of March 3 to the Senate, to discuss the ways and means of convening a representative chamber. Yet in his majesty's name the authorities are now prosecuting communal bodies and individual peasants for having availed themselves of that permission. In like manner, the Emperor undertook to widen the basis of national education. A few days later, however, his minister narrowed it considerably, and deprived the national school teachers of some of the scanty rights which they had theretofore enjoyed. Again, Nicholas II. adjured the Russian press to defend the cause of truth and to help him with frank advice. Yet the newspapers have ever since been forbidden to publish facts about workmen's strikes, about troubles in rural districts, about most of the burning topics of the day, while every number of the organ of the zemstvos has been confiscated by the police.

That most precious of all the promised reforms, liberty of conscience, has also been nullified in a similar way. Though it is ostensibly allowable for a man to leave the orthodox church yet the members of other sects are forbidden to induce or help him to leave, so that if a clergyman of any other church receives a convert from the orthodox communion he is open to prosecution and heavy punishment, while the convert would be severely dealt with as a witness whose status in Russia may be made as bad as the prisoner's. As the writer phrases it: "It is like telling a man he may travel from New York to Buffalo on condition that he does not pass through the intermediary space."

Those recent promises of a representative chamber, plans for which are ostensibly being framed now, has no more chance of fulfillment than these. Says Dr. Dillon. And since governmental reforms are impossible under the present regime and since the people are determined to have those reforms, he sees no way out but by revolution. Indeed he holds those frantic struggles at Lodz, at Liban, on board the Kriaz Potemkin as not the presage of the revolution but a part of it. All that is needed for its success is a rallying thing, and that, he thinks, will be provided when the zemstvo delegates carry out their expressed intention—if the Czar fails to convulse a representative assembly in a few weeks—of forming provisional boards of government for the provinces.

Of the result he has no doubts. In the face of the coalition of all the intelligent classes at home and shut out from further aggrandisement abroad, absolutism, he declares, is doomed; possibly the end will come within the year.

St. John carmen feel that they have been badly treated at the Sydney races. While we believe the North Stars to be the better crew, the decision which gave them the race was hardly fair to St. John.—Halifax Echo.  
The Echo has as much ground for its opinion that the North Stars are the better crew as it has for the belief that Halifax is fitter to be a winter port. Leaving the unfortunate mixup at the turning buoy out of the question, the fact remains that the Carleton crew were in the lead by about six lengths before the turn and had rounded for home before their opponents needed a buoy. Does that look as if the Halifax crew were the better?

A new word has been coined. The Macleod Gazette refers to the distribution of constituencies in Alberta as the "disgraceful Olivermander." E. B. Ridge, once Governor of Massachusetts, will now lose to the Canadian Minister of the Interior, the unsavory distinction of having given rise to the word that stands for party trickery in arranging the boundaries of constituencies. A gerrymander has become that worse thing an Olivermander.—Winnipeg Telegram.

It is said that Mr. Parmelee, deputy minister of trade and commerce, will be superannuated, and that his place will be taken by Mr. F. C. O'Hara, who is a connection of Sir Richard Cartwright. Mr. O'Hara is already in the public service. As Sir Richard has no relatives left without office, there is nothing now to be done for the family but increase their pay.—Sun.

## DUFFY WILL RETIRE.

World's Champion Sprinter, Home After Record Breaking Tour, Announces His Intention to Leave the Track.

NEW YORK, Aug. 7.—Arthur F. Duffy, champion sprinter of the world who recently returned from a successful trip abroad has decided to retire from the cinder path, says the Herald. His reason for retiring is that he has had his day and that he would rather retire when at the height of his fame than wait until defeated.  
While abroad Duffy won two new championships and established three world's records for short distance events.  
His best performance was his victory over G. A. Wigram, the Australian, one hundred yard champion, who had not been defeated before in years. Duffy also took the measure of Macpherson of New Zealand.  
In speaking of his trip to New Zealand Duffy says that the runners there were started as horses are at the race track in this country. Every runner has to step into his partition with a barrier across his breast and when everything is ready the starter snaps it. About Australian runners Duffy says they are slow to begin but once under way there are no faster men in the world.  
Of English runners he says: "Let them once master a quick start and there will be no sprinters in the world who will have anything on them. As it is now there is no question in my mind and my victories away from home would tend to show it, that the Yankee short distance men are, as a class, as good superior to the English as the English distance runners are superior to the Americans."

## SEC'Y. ROOT ANGLING IN AND FOR Nfld.

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Aug. 7.—United States secretary of state, Root, who is now salmon fishing on the west coast of Newfoundland, will arrive here tomorrow to remain a few days, according to Labrador to view the eclipse of the sun. It is understood that he will hold a conference with colonial ministry respecting the Bona-Fax treaty, with a view of affecting a compromise which will prevent the enforcement of the Bait Act and grant the colony the advantage of the American fish markets.
