### NURSE ATTEMPTS TO POISON PATIENT

Chicago's Oldest Lawyer Also Concerned in Plot to Murder Aged Woman to Secure Her Estate.

CHICAGO, Ill., Aug. 11.—Moses B. Brown, the oldest practicing attorney in Chicago; Austin F. Kelley, and Ruth McLaughlin, charged with conspiracy to murder Mrs. Annie M. Nolan, were found guilty by a jury in Judge Wieda's court today. Kelley and Mrs. McLaughlin were sentenced to indeterminate terms in the penitentiary, while the aged lawyer, who, it was said, had been led by the others, escaped with a fine of \$5,000.

Assistant Attorney Rittenhaus spared Kelley and Brown in his arraignment, declaring that the woman had furnished the poison which she used to poison Mrs. Nolan. Mrs. Nolan was old and ailing and had been in the hospital for some time. Brown drew up the deed and Kelley became a lodger at the home of Mrs. Nolan. Then the conspiracy to hasten the change in ownership of the estate was formed and poison in small doses was administered to the patient. When the situation came under police observation and arrests were made, Mrs. Nolan was still alive, but very ill. She is now in a sanitarium.

### MONTREAL LAD KILLED BY POWDER EXPLOSION

Supposed He Was Smoking Cigarettes in Attic Where Powder Was Stored.

MONTREAL, Aug. 11.—A boy named Jack MacNeil was killed today in an explosion of black powder in an attic in the rear of the Letang Hardware Company's premises on St. Paul street. The powder, twenty-five pounds in all, had been placed there prior to delivery to a customer. Letourneau was alone in the store when the explosion occurred. The roof of the store was blown off and fell with a deafening crash into the street.

### BRYAN'S FRIENDS IN CONFERENCE

Prodict Victory for Democrats—Plans for the Campaign.

LINCOLN, Neb., Aug. 11.—Bringing prophesies of democratic victory to Mr. Bryan on the eve of his notification, John W. Kern, vice-presidential candidate of the Democratic ticket, Norman E. Mack, chairman of the Democratic National Committee and several other prominent Democrats were the vanguard of interesting arrivals today to attend the event tomorrow.

Within a few minutes after arrival Chairman Mack, Mr. Kern, Jos. Daniels, head of the literary bureau of the national committee, Governor John D. Owens, of Wyoming and John B. Lamb, of Indiana, were in conference with Mr. Bryan at his home on questions vital to the success of the coming campaign. The conference was continued at a later hour tonight, following a dinner tendered to Humphrey O'Sullivan, of Lowell, Mass., the newly elected secretary of the national committee by the American Typographical Union. Mr. Bryan was a guest.

The conference with Mr. Bryan had to do in a general way with the outline of the coming campaign together with a tentative plan that has already been formulated for the conduct of the coming presidential struggle. A general speaking campaign for Mr. Bryan in different parts of the country also came up for consideration but no dates which would include a tour of the middle west were definitely decided upon.

### TRAINING QUARTERS SECURED

LONDON, Aug. 11.—Sporting Life announces that everything has been arranged except the signing of an agreement for James H. Keene and August Belmont to take the Epsom Lodge at Newmarket as training quarters for their horses.

The paper thinks that if the crisis in American turf affairs brings about any serious invasion of the English turf by the Americans it would be advisable for the invaders to make Newmarket their home because there is no place in the world with equal facilities for horsemen.

PARSBORO, N. S., Aug. 11.—M. Cochrane launched from his shipyard at Port Greville today at 11 o'clock the fine tern schooner "Exilda." The launch was witnessed by a large crowd of people, a number going from here in the tug Parraboro and the Methodist congregation held a large tea meeting in connection with the launching and a good sum was realized. The Exilda, 349 tons register, is 144.9 long, 34.0 wide and 11.4 feet deep. She is all galvanized and classed for twelve years in the American record, fitted and filled with steam hoisting gear and is in every respect a first class vessel. She is owned by the builder, Mr. Cochrane, of Newton Pugsley, A. A. Bent, Alonzo O. Seaman and Captain Bedford Tower, who will command her, and she is all fitted and ready for sea and proceeds at once to Eatonville to load up for New York.
