THE CAMPOBELLO SHOOTING.

A. W. Macrae appears for the Prisoner—Case Against Simonson Dismissed.

WELSHPOOL, Campobello, Sept. 21.—George F. Simonson, who was arrested last Saturday night on suspicion of shooting Edward North, Clarence Lank and other boys on George Watson's wharf, was by order of Luke Byron, J. P., placed under guard in his own vessel and commanded to appear for trial this morning. Last night the prisoner eluded the vigilance of his guard and escaped, and has not since been seen. The trial opened this morning at 11 o'clock. Mr. Macrae of St. John appeared for the defence and Howard Grimmer of St. Andrews for the prosecution. Mr. Macrae, on behalf of Simonson, made the following preliminary objection to the trial.

First—That no sworn information had been laid before the justice.

Second—That no offence had been set out either in the warrant or information.

Third—That the court had no jurisdiction to issue that form of warrant under Chap. 62, Sec. 8, of the Consolidated Statutes of New Brunswick.

wick as the information did not set out an offence as provided for in sections one and four, chapter 62.

Fourth—That the court had no power to commit the prisoner to the charge of a constable during the adjournment from Saturday till Wednesday (a space of more than three clear days).

Fifth—That the court had no power to continue the hearing, as, on the 17th, the prisoner was neither remanded nor placed under a cognisance.

Sixth—That if there were any offence, it was an indictable one, and the court had not jurisdiction so far to hold the preliminary examination.

Mr. Macrae then moved for an immediate dismissal of the case, which was refused. He then gave notice that he would apply to a superior court to have the whole proceedings set aside.

The court opened again at 4.30. Mr. Simonson was not present. On advice of the counsel for the prosecution, Mr. Byron dismissed the case.

Mr. Simonson has since turned up at Lubec, Maine. The boy who was shot is recovering rapidly. He is being nursed by Miss Alice Watson, a nurse from a Boston hospital.
