BIG STOCK EXCHANGE FIRM FAILS

Montreal, August 13.—Ennis & Stoppani, members of the Consolidated Stock Exchange, of New York and correspondent for Bryant Bros & Co., stock brokers, of this city, announced a suspension of business at 11 o'clock this morning, with liabilities estimated at \$1,500,000.
The firm was one of the oldest houses in New York city.
Mr. Norris P. Bryant, of Bryant Bros. & Co., was seen by the Star at noon today. He made the following statement:
"A very unfortunate incident occurred this morning, when Ennis & Stoppani, our New York correspondents, announced a suspension of business. While for a time we will be handicapped here, it is our intention to continue business as heretofore."
Mr. Bryant is of the opinion that \$1,500,000 is a very conservative estimate of the liabilities of Ennis & Stoppani.
Mr. Brant stated that Bryant Bros. were today paying up all the small accounts.
As to the larger accounts he would make no definite statement, but intimated that he thought little difficulty would be experienced with them.
The cause of the collapse of Ennis & Stoppani was a recent judgment rendered against them in connection with the Northern Pacific Railroad panic of eight years ago, when the firm was caught in the sensational markets of that time.

Great Interest in Montreal.
The New York failure created an immense amount of interest here, as Bryant Bros. are said to have done the largest brokerage business in this city, and certainly have the most elaborate offices in town.
Mr. Bryant's many friends were greatly upset over the news, and he received offers of assistance from many who esteem him for his square dealings with his clients.
Had Big Business.
In addition to the New York connections, Bryant Bros. have done a big business in Cobalt stocks, and have customers all over Canada who, however, are not expected to suffer as a result of the New York failure.
Liabilities, \$1,500,000.
New York, April 13.—An involuntary petition in bankruptcy was filed in the U. S. District Court here today, against the brokerage firm of Ennis & Stoppani, members of the Consolidated Stock Exchange, and the Chicago Board of Trade.
Lindsay Russell was appointed receiver.
The liabilities are alleged in the petition to be \$1,500,000, and the assets \$400,000.
New York, April 13.—Following the appointment of the receiver in the bankruptcy proceedings it was announced that Ennis & Stoppani had made a general assignment to Treadwell Cleveland, assignee.
