OTTAWA, March 9.—(By Canadian Press).—In a judgment issued today the board of rallway commissioners grants the application of the Railway Association of Canada for permission to make surcharges on paesenger trainic between Canada and the United States. This means that Canadians purchasing passenger tickets to United States points will be required to pay, not only the usual price of the ticket, but an additional amount to cover the difference in value between Canadian and United States money. The surcharges provided for depend in amount on the distance from the border of the place where the ticket is purchased. The order providing for the system of surcharges will go into effect on March 15.


