PRAYERS.

The following Petitions were severally brought up, and laid on the Table:-

By the Honorable Mr. MacInnes (Burlington),—Of Samuel May, of the City of Toronto.

By the Honorable Mr. Read (Quinté),—Of C. A. Myers, and others, of the Village of Morrisburg.

Pursuant to the Order of the Day, the following Petitions were severally read:-

Of the Honorable W. E. Sanford, and others, of Hamilton and elsewhere; praying to be incorporated as "The Saskatchewan Colonization Railway Company."

Of George W. Yarker and others; praying to be incorporated as "The York County Bank."

Of the Board of Trade, of the City of Toronto; praying for the passing of an Act increasing their powers of holding land; increasing their borrowing powers; confirming a certain agreement with their debenture holders; giving them further powers with regard to their debentures and the purposes for which they are issued; and that section seven of "The Act respecting Interest" shall not apply to debentures or securities issued by them;—and

Of the Port Arthur, Duluth and Western Railway Company; praying for an Act extending the time for the completion of their works; giving them power to receive bonuses in aid of their work; empowering them to build certain branch lines and enlarging their bonding powers.
