VII. And whereas it is expedient that the Bounty hereby granted to Doubly exthe Importers and Proprietors of Fish landed in the United Kingdonin tended to fach thould be extended to Milk the deline the United Kingdoning Fish landed in should be extended to l'ish landed in the Islands of Gvernser and Jersey The Guernsey and it therefore enacted, That upon the Importation of the like Sold of Jeffer, Fish into the Islands of Guernsey and Jessey respectively, from the Matte of Newfoundland and the Coast of Labrador, there shall be paid and allowed to the Importer or Proprietor thereof, the like Bounty of Three Shithing's for every Quintal or Hundred Weight of such Fish, and so in Proposition for any greater or less Quantity, which Bounty shall be paid upen the following Conditions, that is to fay, Upon the Master and Mate of every Ship or Veffel in which such Fish shall be imported, making Oath aritic Port or Place of Importation before the proper Officer of the Custoins there (which Oath he is hereby authorized to administer) that all the said IMA imported in the faid Ship or Veffel was cured by His Majefty's Subjects carrying on the Fishery at Locofoundland and Coast of Labradar, as the Case may be, and has not since been landed in any Port of Place in Great Britain or Ireland, for the Purpose of receiving the Bounty payable-bylds Act upon such Fish when imported into Great Britain or Ireland respectively; and also upon such Fish being examined by Favoyindisterent and difinterested Persons residing in the said Islands respectively experienced in the Nature of such Fish, appointed for that Purpose by the Commissioners of His Majelly's Cultoms for the Time being in England, which Persons fo appointed, shall declare upon their Corporal Oaths, to be administered by luch proper Officer as aforesaid, whether the said Fish or any Part thereof is or is not merchantable, and in case any such Fish, or any Part thereof shall, upon such Declaration, appear not to be merchantable, no Bounty shall be allowed or paid on the Importation thereof.

VIII. Provided always, and be it further enacted, That Salted Cod Fish which may be and Salmon, upon which the Bounty above mentioned shall have been exported paid as aforesaid, may nevertheless be exported without being subject to the without Re-Repayment of the said Bounty, any Thing in this or in any other Act to the Edunty. contrary in anywife notwithstanding.

IX.
