WAS NO STRANGER.

Detectives Says They Are Getting More Evidence Re. Miss Lowery's Murder From Mrs. Covell

Rodney, April 22.-Very little new light was shed yesterday on the mur-der mystery. All the clues have been der mystery. All the clues have been exhausted, and the detectives have very little to go on. Word of the arrest of Prestage Clark, a Toronto laborer who has been working in the burnt district at Jeannette Creek, reached the officers last night and he will be brought here to-day for examination. The man says he spent the night of the murder in Tom Hutchinsen's planing mill, and that he left the next morning. The mill is 13-4 miles south from the scene of the murder. Nothing is expected to develop as a result of the arrest.

Provincial Detectives were with Mrs. Covell for two hours yesterday afternoon, and last night they pointed out that they were getting more evidence.

To support the theory that the murder was someone that lived in these parts years ago is the fact that the murderer thought Miss Lowery, the dead woman, was Mary Taylor, who died over year ago. Had the murderer been a present resident the officers point out that he would have heard of her death.

The use by the murderer of the names of Tom Barlow, John Head and the old couple's nephew, Benjamin J. Covell of Bismark, is also put forth as a circumstance to strengthen the theory. Last night another nephew of Mr. Covell was examined by the detectives and allowed to go.

Provincial Detective Greer goes to London to-day to attend the Loomis murder preliminary investigation. The prisoner, Clarke, the detectives say, may be the man who was driven to Ridgetown as stated by a farmer on Wednesday after the murder, The farmer will see bim to-day.

DELGASSE AND THE WAR

French Foreign Minister Wants to Resign Because of It.

rance Arouses Russia and Latte Sends Caution to Rojestvensky French Neutrality Discussed by Foreign Secretary Lansdowne and Baron Hayashi - France Makes Good and Sends Cruiser and Five Torpede Boats to Kamranh.

Paris, April 22.—After a notable Faris, April 22.—After a notable service of nearly eight years in the direction of foreign affairs. Theophile Deleasse yesterday informed the president of the Council Rouvier of his desire and intention to resign.

This announcement came as a surprise and shock to M. Deleasse's colleagues, who immediately took steps to endeavor to secure a reconsideration of

endeavor to secure a reconsideration of his determination. A cabinet council was held, at which M. Rouvier laid the was held, at which M. Rouvier laid the situation before the Ministers. It was unanimously decided that the interest of the country required that M. Delcasse retain his portfolio.

Accordingly, Mr. Rouvier proceeded to the Quai D'Orsay, where he conferred with the Minister of Foreign Affairs. Voicing the wishes of President

fairs. Voicing the wishes of President Loubet and the Ministers, M. Rouvier

Loubet and the Ministers, M. Rouvier earnestly besought M. Delcasse to retain his place in the Cabinet.

It is evident that M. Rouvier's earnest appeal caused M. Delcasse to waver in his determination, M. Delcasse, he said, had promised to reserve his determination until to-day. It is believed that M. Delcasse will withdraw his restration

lieved that M. Delcasse will withdraw his resignation.

The Reason Why.

The motives leading up to M. Delcasse's sudden determination to retire are primarily attributed to international controversies over French neutrality in the Far East. The Opposition headed by Socialists and Nationalists have directed their criticalists. tion headed by Socialists and Nationalists have directed their criticisms on M. Delcasse. It is felt that his retirement now would be halled in Germany as a German triumph, and this is one of the considerations leading M. Rouvier to earnestly appeal to M. Delcasse to remain in the Foreign Office. In order to secure definite co-operation between three departments of

on between three departments of the Government, namely, naval. and foreign, a conference yesterday was held between leading representatives of each department. This brought about a clear understanding regarding the measures necessary for the maintenance of the neutrality of Indo-Chinese waters. nese waters.

Paris, April 22.—As a result of communications between the Governments at Paris and St. Petersburg, the Russian Government has forwarded urgent orders to Admiral Rojestvensky, rigorously to respect the neutrality of French waters. This is a precautionary measure. In addition, special instructions have been serviced. ary measure. In addition, special instructions have been sent to the Governor-General of Indo-China, M. Beau, and Foreign Minister Deicasse has instructed the French Minister at Tokio to give the Japanese Minister for Foreign Affairs assurances that it is France's purpose to preserve strict neutrality.

St. Petersburg, April 22.—The latest word received of Admiral Rojestvensky is the despatch from the agent of the finance ministry at Shanghal, saying the squadron had passed through the Straits of Formosa, but the authority given by the agent for his statement is considered doubtful.

Nothing has been heard from the south division of the Russian squadon, commanded by Admiral Nebogatoff. Most of the naval men express the opinion that Rojestvensky will not await a juncture with Nebogatoff, but sent to Governor-General Beau require him to report the exact location of Ad-miral Roiestvensky's ships, whether miral Rojestvensky's ships, whether they are or are not within the three-

mile limit.

Discussed in London.
London, April 22.—All the Government offices were closed yesterday and most of the officials were out of town making it almost impossible to secure an official statement regarding Great Britain's contemplated or actual action in connection with the neutrality question in the indo-Chinese waters. The question was discussed between Baron Hayashi, the Japanese Minister, and Foreign Secretary Lansdowne. Sir Francis Bertie, the British Ambassador to France, left London yesterday morning for Paris, and it is considered likely that he is the bearer of special inly that he is the bearer of special instructions

France Makes Good. Saigon, French Cochin-China, April 22.—Admiral Jonquieres of the French navy returned Thursday evening from Kamranh Bay on the torpedo boat destroyer Takou, and announces that he left in Kamranh harbor a cruiser and five formedo beat to incurse and stroyer Takou, and announces that he left in Kamranh harbor a cruiser and five torpedo boats to insure neutrality. He confirms the statement that certain ships of the Russian Baltic squadron are in the outside bay, but will not disclose whether they are battleships or cruisers, or whether any of the ships belong to the main fighting fleet of Admiral Rojestvensky. The admiral did say there had been no breach of diplomatic usage. The Russian warships are well outside the territorial three-mile limit for which France is responsible because of the Colonial rights in Annam. Admiral Jonquieres sailed from Kamranh Bay at 8 o'clock Thursday morning, and this establishes the fact that the Russian ships are not on their way to Formosa.

Where Togos is.

No Japanese cruisers or other warships have been reported since Tuesday night, when Admiral Togo's flying squadron was seen north of the Paracels Islands, about 240 miles from Kamranh Bay.
