ACTION OF CITIZENS OF BADDECK RESPECTING THE FREE SETTING OF THE "BILVER-DARK": Reported by Wm. F. Bodwin, Supt. of Boinn Bhreagh Laboratory.

Baddock. H.S., Jan. El. 1909: The citizens of Baddock realizing the importance of Dr. Bell's experimental work to this community felt that it would be a mark of appreciation to use their influence, as a Team, with the Minister of Customs to admit free of duty the flying machine "Silver-Dart" which is being transferred from the Aerial Experiment Association's Plant at Harmondsport, N.Y., to Dr. Bell's Estate at Beinn Bhreagh, near Baddock. The following telegram was therefore sent to the Minister of Customs:

Baddeck, Jan. 16, 1909

To Hon. Mr. Patterson, Minister of Castess, Ottawa, Canada.

Citizens Baddeck very anxious that you allow free entry on experimental flying machine and apparatus for Dr. Graham Boll which arrived last night.

Have written Collector Baddack respecting admission flying machine.

I could not get a copy of the letter to the Collector of Customs referred to in the above telegram, but have been informed that it says in substance, that there shall be no duty charged if machine is returned within two years.
