Of Straight Business The Board of Water Commissioners have laid down a hard-andfast rule that no mains will be extended beyond the city limits, but a service will be given to those people living on the outside of bound-

ary streets. The commissioners, Mr. A. G. Montgomery dissenting, consider that it is merely a matter of business to give the service and entails no additional capital expenditure. The township residents so situated must pay, under the Act, double rates, and they must also pay the entire charge of connections. Moreover, under their agreement, the city, if a shortage of water should ensue, can cut the supply to the outside off at a moment's notice. The commissioners think that there will be no shortage, and that by giving the servicea maximum revenue will be secured on the cost of laying the mains along boundary streets, a cost which must be met for the benefit of those living within the city.

Four Notorious Gunmen Were Executed Early This Morning.

Distressing Scenes Wer Went to Death.

SING SING PRISON, Ossining, N.Y., April 13.—The four gunmen convicted of the murder of Herman Rosenthal, the New York gambler, died in the electric chair at Sing Sing prison at the break of dawn this Easter Monday morning. None confessed his guilt and none mentioned the name of Charles Becker, the former police lieutenant, found guilty of instigating the murder, but saved by ourt of appeals reversal. Of the our who died, Frank Seidenshner ("Whitey Lewis") made the only statement. Even he did not flatly as-

"Gentlemen," he mumbled, as they strapped him in the chair, "I did not shot at Rosenthal. They who said I did was perjurers. For the sake of justice, gentlemen, I say I didn't.

The witness, Stannish,-"Whitey" did not finish the senence. The harness had been adjusted and the current shot his body forward in the chair. He had meant to say that Stannish, a waiter and a vitness at the murder trial, had lied, ut death intervened.

Seidenshner was the second man die. "Dago Frank" (Frank Ciroci) came first. "Gyp the Blood" (Harry Horowitz) was third and "Lefty Louie" (Louis Rosenberg) last. In forty minutes flat all four were despatched. This time would have been shortened had it not been for the overcrowding of newspaper reporters. Their numbers necessitated a shifting of witnesses for each

execution. There was no untoward incident throughout the procedure. All walked juietly to their doom, and only their quaking knees and the sickly green pallor of their faces attested that the realization of death was upon them,

prayer for the dying. "Gentlemen," said Rabbi Goldstein, as he left the death chamber, "If you ask me whether the Jewish poys were guilty, I will say I do not know. They did not confess to me. As for the Italian, I do not believe he was at the scene of the crime. I do not think any of them should have been convicted on the testimony offered."

An anaemic moon still hung in the sky when those who were to witness the executions, gathered in front of the prison. The air was chill, and a raw wind swept across the Hudson which binds the prison at the west. Faint lights glimmered at corridor ends of the buildings, but no sound same from within. The hideoous noises which convicts have been said to emit when one or more of their number is to die, were spared those who waited.

Dawn was just creeping over the nills when the witnesses were admitted to the bare court yard of the death house. Many were ashen faced and trembling. From a printed list who were to see the first man die. A moment more and the door of the deep knowledge of the seamy side came through the little iron door at shown signs of collapsing, and it was deemed expedient to shield him from the ordeal of waiting.
