THAW WAS
NOT INSANE
SAYS DOCTOR

When He Killed Stanford
White—Not a Paranoiac.

By Special Wire to the Courier.

New York, June 29.—Dr. Charles P. Bancroft, head of the New Hampshire state hospital for the insane and a member of the federal commission, which examined Harry K. Thaw during his sojourn in New Hampshire, swore on the witness stand to-day that in his opinion Thaw not only was sane but always had been sane. Dr. Bancroft testified as an expert witness in the jury proceedings to determine Thaw's mental condition.

Thaw's act in killing Stanford White was not, Dr. Bancroft said, the product of a systematic delusion such as characterized the true paranoiac.

"The killing of Stanford White," he said, "appeared to us a passionate impulsive act, growing out of a condition of mind due chiefly to anger and jealousy, which was the final culmination of a series of circumstances that had been bearing down on him a long time. It did not seem a type of parania but was due to jealousy of Mr. White, not to a diseased condition of mind."

"Thaw knew that White had been antagonistic to him in an unpleasant way. He wanted to get even with White. His act was the product of a sane mind which, after he had indulged in champagne, suddenly lost control of itself."

"Then you believe Thaw never was insane," asked Deputy Attorney-General Becker.

"I do," was the reply. "Another reason for my belief is that Thaw expressed regret for his deed. A paranoiac never expresses regret. He continually tries to justify the deed and no amount of persuasion can convince him that he has done wrong."

LETTER FROM
PTE. GILLEN

Written When the Patricias Were
With British Regulars.

Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Gillen, Echo
Plant, received a letter from their son Charles, who went to the front with the Princess Pats, as a member of Canada's crack regiment. Charlie was one of the first Brantford men to enter the firing line against the Germans. When the war broke out he was a member of the Toronto Police force and when the Patricias were organized at Ottawa, he offered his services and was accepted. He has been very lucky so far, although he was nearly buried alive in one of the trenches last February, while under a heavy shell fire, and was laid up in the hospital for a time, but he soon recovered and returned to the front. Below is the letter.

Dear Parents—Just a few lines to
let you know I am well and feeling fine. I received a letter from you last night, that was written on the 13th of April. I did not know that Ed. Caton was over in England with the Canadians until I got your letter last night, but of course I had no way of knowing, for we are not with the Canadian contingent. We are attached to the 87th Division of the British regulars, so we don't see anything of the Canadians at all. Things are much better here now than they were in the winter time, the ground has all dried up. There is lots of hard fighting to do in the trenches, but it gets into our eyes and nearly blinds us. We could use that stuff too if we wanted to, but I think we can lick them without resorting to such methods.

The Germans do not seem to have
as good a class of men here as they had on the start, although some of them are very brave. There are others who, when we get anywhere near them with the bayonet will run and squeal like good fellows. We have been back to the rear to-day for a rest, but we expect to go into action again to-night, so I thought I would scribble you a few lines before I went. There is a big fight on up at the front, but we don't see anything of the Germans. We can hardly hear ourselves speak for the thunder of the guns. We have been giving it to the Germans hard this last few days and they seem to be getting weak along the front. One would think the war would not last much longer from the looks of things here, but of course we don't know what is going on at other parts of the line, but it can't last forever the way it is going now.

The Patricias have lost a lot of
men in killed and wounded since we came over here last December, but we keep getting more all the time and the boys are still able to give a good account of themselves at every opportunity.

Well dear parents, I must close
now. Remember me to all. Write soon. Hope this will find you all well. From Charlie.

MEXICANS ARE
BEING CLOSELY
LOOKED AFTER

By Special Wire to the Courier.

Washington, June 29.—Agents of
the United States Government were to-day busily engaged all over the country watching carefully the movements of prominent Mexicans who have been active in Mexican politics, and also those suspected of such activity to see that there are no violations of American neutrality.

The arrest of Generals Victoriano Huerta and Pascual Orozco, at El Paso, and the strict surveillance over General Felix Diaz, Mondragon, Blanquet and Felipe Angeles, now living in the United States, and others is a part of the general policy of the American Government to try and prevent the setting afoot of any new military movement in Mexico. Officials here feel that the revolutionary situation in Mexico ought not to be further complicated by the introduction of new elements.

In line with its policy to prevent, if
possible, further revolutionary movements in the southern republic, or at least the setting on foot of any such expeditions on American soil, the government proposes to prosecute vigorously violations of neutrality regardless of the prominence of the individuals or their affiliations.

FRENCH
OFFICIAL

By Special Wire to the Courier.

Paris, June 29, 2:37 p.m.—The
French War Office this afternoon gave out a report on the progress of hostilities which reads as follows:

"In the territory to the north of
Arras there was a continuance last night of the cannonading, particularly to the north and south of Souchez, and in the north of Neuville. An infantry engagement made it possible for us to make progress along the road between Angres and Ablain.

"In the Argonne, at Bagatelle, yester-
day witnessed incessant fighting with torpedoes and hand grenades.

"The Germans were successful in forcing
back for the moment, our advance posts located on the slopes to the east of Metzcel. We at once delivered a counter attack and re-occupied part of the ground lost.

"On the remainder of the front the
night passed quietly."

town \$250 for fireworks and has arranged sports for the Fourth of July.
