**NO COMMISSION ON CONTRACTS**  
 United States Fuse Manufacturer Testifies Before Commission.  
 Ottawa, May 9.—R. F. Patterson, the first of the American fuse contractors to testify before the Meredith-Duff Commission, denied absolutely under oath yesterday that any commission or consideration of any kind had been paid in connection with securing contracts from the International Arms and Fuse Company.  
 Mr. Patterson was a decidedly impressive witness, and gave his evidence in a decisive manner that discouraged cross-examination, the more so, that Mr. Hellmuth in his examination-in-chief and followed his price more than only examining the witness, but cross-examining him with an evident idea of bringing out every fact in connection with the contract.  
 The result of this was that when Mr. Johnston's turn came for cross-examination there was little left for him to do. Mr. Patterson's evidence was entirely in accordance with the statements made by Mr. Kite as to the part played by the International Arms and Fuse Company in its dealing with the Shell Committee, except that deliveries were delayed.  
 With regard to the advances made by the Shell Committee to the International Arms and Fuse Company, he stated that in financing the undertaking, not only the advances, but much more had been invested in the undertaking, and he declared that the cancellation of the contract owing to delays in delivery was the result of the shell orders from Canada, and this was done.  
 It is expected that Mr. Patterson will resume the stand to-day, and that he will be succeeded by Dr. Harris, who conducted the early negotiations with the Shell Committee in connection with the International Arms and Fuse Company.  
**AUSTRIA TELLS UNITED STATES WHAT HAPPENED**  
 Denies That Imperator Was Fired Upon by Sub Without Warning.  
 By Special Wire to the Courier.  
 Washington, May 9.—The Austrian Government, through the American Ambassador Penfield at Vienna, has furnished the United States with its version of the attack by one of its submarines upon the Russian battleship Imperator, from which two Americans are now wounded, were rescued.  
 Austria denies that the vessel was fired upon without warning, as was stated in an official report regarding the attack made to the state department by the American consul at Barcelona, Spain. The denial came in response to an inquiry made by Ambassador Penfield at the direction of Secretary Lansing.  
 It was authoritatively stated that the vessel, the *U-29*, was fired upon to establish the facts in the case, with a view of taking further action should it be warranted.  
 The Imperator, bound from Gullport, Miss., to Marseilles, France, encountered an Austrian submarine on April 11, off the Cullumbere Islands. Despatches to the state department said no warning was given the vessel and that three shots were fired, one taking effect. The vessel was reported to have been set afire by the submarine.

**DAYLIGHT SAVING IN GREAT BRITAIN**  
 Clocks to be Advanced One Hour on Saturday, May 20th.  
 London, May 9.—The House of Commons yesterday after a short discussion adopted the motion of Sir Henry Norman, favoring daylight saving. The vote was 170 to 2.  
 The government will introduce a bill immediately, and if, as seems virtually certain, it passes all stages this week, the daylight-saving measure will go into effect Saturday, May 20, when at midnight clocks will be advanced.  
 Very little objection was raised against the motion and what there was came mainly from those representing agricultural interests. Sir Henry Norman estimated that the economy in lighting alone would be £2,500,000 yearly. Herbert L. Samuel, Home Secretary, on behalf of the government, said that under such a measure there would be an enormous saving of coal, which was greatly needed by the Entente allies. Concerning the Government's intentions in the matter, Mr. Samuel said it was deemed advisable to seek Parliamentary sanction rather than to proceed by an administrative order. The bill, he added, would be operative only for the duration of the war, so that afterward the question could be reconsidered in the light of experience. He suggested that the normal time be restored September 30.

**GERMANY NAVAL**  
 Says Two German Torpedo Boats Fought Five British Destroyers and Damaged One Them.  
 By Special Wire to the Courier.  
 Berlin, May 10 (by wireless to the Courier).—In an engagement off the East coast on Monday between German and British torpedo craft, a British destroyer was badly damaged, according to official announcements by the German admiralty under date of May 9.  
 "Two German torpedo boats," said the official statement, "while reconnoitering on the morning of May 9, had a brief engagement north of Oostend with five British torpedo boat destroyers. One destroyer was badly damaged by artillery fire. The German torpedo boats returned to port undamaged."  
**MARQUIS AND LADY ABERDEEN HERE TOMORROW**  
 Will Address Meeting Victoria Hall in the Afternoon.  
**CIVIC LUNCH IN THEIR HONOR**  
 The Marquis and Marchioness Aberdeen and Tenuair, accompanied by Sir John and Lady Gilling, Major Sarnford of Hamilton, and Mr. W. G. Sturges of Toronto, president of the National Council of Women, will arrive in Brantford to-morrow (10.30) by private radial car from Hamilton. They will be met by Mayor Bowly, Mrs. Buck, representing the local Council of Women and Miss Livingston, representing the Women's Peace League, and the late Mrs. Kerby House, where a civic luncheon will be held in their honor at 2 o'clock.  
 At 3.30 the Marchioness of Aberdeen will address a meeting in Victoria Hall. Lady Aberdeen is president of the International Council of Women and will likely urge upon the audience the necessity of forming circles for the study of the international peace when the time for peace comes. She also makes a plea for liberal help for the blind, particularly soldiers, emphasizing the importance of plenty of reading material, although it is expensive and takes a much room. The Marquis of Aberdeen will very likely address the meeting.
