## TO RUN CARS ON RIGHT SIDE OF MARKET STREET

Council Will Petition Parlt. To Amend St. Railway Charter

ADD TO COMMISSION Would Appoint Mayor and Chairman of Finance to Board

Because the street railway commission refuse to run their cars up Market street on the right side, the city council will make application to Ottawa to have the Mayor and civic finance chairman added to the board of commissioners. Such was the decision reached by the council last night, after the subject had been brought up by Ald. Boddy. The council sat until eleven p.m., and put through a heavy grist of business, including the usual degree of expediency.

## Buildings and Grounds

The buildings and grounds committee reported as follows:

1. We recommend that tenders be called for alterations for the fire hall for sleeping quarters for three more men and that lumber be purchased for the smoking room for the firemen, they to do the work themselves.

2. That Mr. Threshers' salary be raised \$20 per month, and that his two helpers be paid 27 cents per hour.

3. That Walter Podd, at the rest station be paid 25 cents per hour, and that Mr. Robinson receive \$2.75 per day.

## Armenian's Pool Room License

The finance committee submitted the following report:

They have given every consideration to the petition of the Armenian asking for an increased number of billiard licenses, and after due consideration, it is not considered desirable that the number of licenses should be increased, but they recommend that it may be possible for them to buy or purchase a billiard license which it is understood, is for sale in the city of Brantford. The committee are not opposed to this being done, provided that they place a suitable place for installing the pool tables.

## Board of Works

The Board of Works reported as follows:

1. That all the communications received by the city clerk in reference to claims for damages by flooding, be referred to the city solicitor.

2. That the following contracts for supplies for 1918 be awarded: Sewer pipe, the Hamilton-Toronto Sewer Pipe Co. of Hamilton; Cement, the Ontario Portland Cement Co.

Special castings, the Hartley Foundry Co. And that the city solicitor be instructed to prepare and complete the necessary contracts and that the cheque of the Ontario Sewer Pipe Co. be returned.

3. That the contract for lumber be not awarded, and that the cheques of the three firms tendering be returned.

4. That no formal tenders were received for road oil, and the matter be held over for further consideration.

## Change Date of Taxes

Ald. Montgomery gave notice of a motion to change the date for the first payment of taxes, those paying in one installment obtaining a larger reduction.

## The Perennial Problem

Ald. Montgomery and Simpson were authorized to represent the city in the gas question, at Hamilton, Schinik, Buffalo and Tilbury. Ald. Montgomery, speaking to the motion held forth the possibility of artificial gas.

Ald. Kelly declared that the original agreement reached between the city, at the time when J. H. Spence was mayor and the Brantford Gas Company called for a supply of pure gas.

Ald. Montgomery expressed the opinion that the fields now in use were nearly exhausted and that new ones must be opened.

The mayor expressed the opinion that the gas committee would discover a solution of the problem. He expressed his intention to ascertain the true state of affairs and letting the public know whether there was any possibility of obtaining a pure gas supply. If factories were using more than their share, a stop should be put to such an abuse.

Ald. Kelly pointed out that an order in council passed by the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board gave the municipality wide powers to direct the use of gas piped within its precincts, for the use of private citizens.

## The Hydro Meeting

Criticism at the absence of Board of Trade officials for their absence from the Hydro meeting in Victoria Hall on Friday night last, was passed by Ald. Clement. He expressed the opinion that the Board of Trade should have been primarily interested in the meeting.

Mayor MacBride stated that representatives of the Board had been present, although not on the platform. He explained that a misunderstanding had arisen as to who was to make arrangements for the meeting. He stated that ex-mayor Bowley had taken a seat upon the platform, and that Mr. Bowley also proposed to attend the Hydro convention in Toronto on Tuesday (to-day) as representative of the City of Brantford. His Worship proposed to call the attention of the chairman of the convention to the fact that the ex-mayor was present in no official status.

Ald. Hurler spoke in defence of ex-mayor Bowley, giving him credit for his past interest in the hydro movement, and suggesting that he be added to the committee attending the convention to-day.

In the past two years, while ex-mayor Bowley occupied the chair, there was never any report on hydro electric matters, submitted to this council, replied the mayor, giving Messrs. W. N. Andrews, C. H. Hartman, W. A. Hollinshead and A. McFarland credit for the success of the system in this city, and declaring that J. W. Bowley had taught the hydro movement at the time of its inception.

Ald. Chalcraft opposed Ald. Hurler's suggestion that the ex-mayor be placed upon the city's delegation.

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## NON PARTIZAN COMMISSION IS DEMANDED

To Administer Affairs of the Blind of Ontario—Request Before Parlt.

Toronto, March 11.—This morning a deputation interested in the welfare of the blind, interviewed the Premier at the Parliament Buildings. The deputation were introduced by J. H. Hancock of Galt, president of the Ontario Association for the Blind.

The deputation presented a resolution to the Premier as follows: "That the government of Ontario be respectfully requested to enact at the forthcoming session of the assembly, the necessary legislation for the creation of a permanent and non-partizan commission for the blind, whose duty it shall be to take steps to deal adequately with the matters set forth above, and all other proper questions hereafter arising in relation to the blind of the province."

"And that the blind shall be represented on this commission by one or more members educated as blind persons."

The deputation claimed that whereas there were 1500 blind people in the province, of whom 80 per cent are adults, a large number being women, for whom very little has yet been done, and as there was little legislation looking to the prevention of blindness, and as the number of blind will be increased by the return of a number of blind soldiers, there should be some adequate provision made. They claimed the blind should be made an asset rather than a liability and they should be trained for different employments.

In reply the premier stated that this matter had been given more consideration than most other things this year, and to show how important he considered it, he had tried to get and had appointed one of the best men possible for the principality of the School for the Blind at Brantford. He promised the deputation that the matter would be considered very carefully.

## PETERBORO EDITOR DEAD

## AGRICULTURAL MEASURES

# The Income War Tax Act

Forms giving particulars of income for the year 1917, must be filled in and filed on or before the 31st March, 1918

Section 4 of the Act provides that all persons resident or ordinarily resident in Canada, shall pay a tax upon income exceeding \$1500 in the case of those single and widows without dependent children, and upon income exceeding \$3000 in the case of all other persons. It also provides that all Corporations and Joint Stock Companies, no matter how created, shall pay the normal tax upon income exceeding \$3000.

The Forms provided by the Department of Finance to be filled in with particulars of the 1917 income of all those whose incomes are liable under the Act, and by Trustees, Corporations and Joint Stock Companies, with information required of them, may be obtained from the District Inspectors of Taxation and from the Postmasters at all leading centres.

## Forms to obtain and Special Features to observe

Individuals—Get Form T 1 to give particulars of their own incomes. In stating Dividends received, give the amount from each Company, listing Canadian and foreign Companies separately. Fill in pages 1, 2 and 3 only. Do not mark on page 4.

The following sample answers, (printed in italics) to questions asked on pages 2 and 3 of Form T 1, will help you to fill in correctly your copies of the Form.

Corporations and Joint Stock Companies. Use Form T2—giving particulars of income. Also attach a financial statement. Under Deductions, show in detail amounts paid to Patriotic Fund and Canadian Red Cross or other approved War Funds.

Trustees, Executors, Administrators of Estates and Assignees use Form T3. Full particulars of the distribution of income from all estates handled must be shown as well as details of amounts distributed. A separate Form must be filled in for each estate.

Employers must use Form T4 to give names and amounts of salaries, bonuses, commissions and other remuneration paid to all employees during 1917 where such remuneration amounted in the aggregate to \$1000 or over.

Corporation Lists of Shareholders.—On Form T5 corporations shall give a statement of all bonuses, and dividends paid to Shareholders residing in Canada during 1917 stating to whom paid, and the amounts.

Penalties.—Default in filing returns renders the person or persons liable on summary conviction to a penalty of one hundred dollars for each day during which the default continues. Any person making a false statement in any return or in any information required by the Minister of Finance shall be liable on summary conviction to a penalty not exceeding ten thousand dollars or to six months imprisonment, or to both fine and imprisonment.

In the case of Forms T1 and T2, keep one copy of the filled in Form and file the other two with the Inspector of Taxation for your District. In the case of T3, T4 and T5, keep one copy and file the other two, with the Commissioner of Taxation, Dept. of Finance, Ottawa.

Forms may be obtained from the District Inspectors of Taxation and from the Postmasters at all leading centres.
