

FRENCH GENERAL PRAISES TROOPS

"Splendid Day For France,"
Says Gen. Gouraud to
His Men

Paris, July 22.—General Gouraud, the commander on the front east of Rheims, where the Germans in their offensive last week were stopped by a stone wall defense, issued the following to his army the day after the German offensive was checked:

"To the soldiers of the Fourth army:
"On July 14, you crushed the effort of fifteen German divisions supported by ten more. Their orders were to reach the Marne that evening. You stopped them just where we decided to engage them and win that battle.
"You have the right to be proud; you heroic infantry machine gunners of advanced positions who gave the signal that the attack had been begun and broken up; you aviators who flew overhead; you battalions and batteries who crushed it; you of the staffs who so carefully prepared the battlefield.
"It is a hard blow for the enemy and it is a splendid day for France. I count upon you for the same result whenever the enemy dares attack you and with all my heart as a soldier I thank you."

BOARD OF CONCILIATION.

Ottawa, July 22.—A board of conciliation has been established by the Minister of Labor to deal with the dispute between the Canadian General Electric Company and its employees. This is the first dispute since the publication of the government's manifesto with regard to labor and the parties have mutually agreed to take advantage of the machinery of the Industrial Disputes Investigation Act and apply for a board. The industry is not one which necessarily falls within the scope of the act. The names of the appointees will be published later.

LIQUOR DISAPPEARS FROM OFFICER'S VAULT

Inspector Mousseau Was to
Test Stuff He Had
Seized

Windsor, July 23.—More than two gallons of liquor seized by License Inspector Mousseau during a Saturday night raid on an alleged "blind pig" has disappeared from the Inspector's vault in the Victoria building on Ouellette avenue.
When Inspector Mousseau opened the vault this morning to "test" the evidence against the alleged violator of the Ontario Temperance Act, he discovered the loss. Until the liquor is located, no action can be taken in the police court against the proprietors of the alleged "blind pig."
Only two other persons, besides the inspector, have the combination of the vault, but these men, the inspector believes, are above suspicion.

SCHOOL CHILDREN SHOT TO DEATH

Had Gathered Around a
Bread Wagon Crying:
"We Are Starving"

Zurich, Switzerland, July 23.—Details of the brutal murder of five school children and the wounding of six others at Pysen, on June 21, have only now become known through an interpretation in the Reichsrat. It appears that a crowd of women and children watching the loading of the bread wagon for the Skoda Works, began to cry, "We are starving! We also want bread!" Suddenly an infantry patrol appeared and without giving an order to the crowd to disperse, or a single word of warning, fired a volley from behind the crowd, killing five children between the ages of 10 and 13 and severely wounding four men and two women. One man died.

AGREE TO INTERVENE.

London, July 22.—A despatch to The Times from Tokyo, dated July 17, quotes a report that the Selyu-Kai party is yielding and will accept the Government's proposals regarding intervention. It is added that the Government has forbidden the press to report movement of troops and other material information. A meeting of army, navy and finance ministers was to have been held on July 18 to complete arrangements for financing and provisioning the Japanese forces.

A Peking despatch of July 17 to The Times says that the character of the contemplated Allied action at Vladivostok has caused satisfaction there. The Allies, it is believed in Peking, cannot do better for the moment, than to aid the Czechs-Slovaks by occupying Vladivostok. Thus supported the Czechs can proceed against the Bolsheviks knowing that effective reinforcements will be available should the task prove more difficult than anticipated.

SIGNALS OF DEFEAT.

London, July 22.—(Via Reuters' Ottawa Agency).—The newspapers expose the absurdity of the German apologies for re-crossing the Marne and remark that the flurried and foolish attempts to disguise disaster are the most significant and the most welcome signals that could be made from Berlin at this particular moment for grave defeat has been imposed on the enemy, who dares not both for political and inability reasons, contemplate failure.

The Crown Prince is fighting furiously between the Marne and Rheims and is ruthlessly sacrificing the rearwards to prevent a rout. It is suggested that General Ludendorff's arrogant under-valuation of the Allied offensive powers is due to his belief in the nonsense recently published in Germany about General Foch and his reserves.


