BRITISH RED CROSS

A notice from the Mayor appears in this issue calling on the Citizens to be present at a meeting to be held on Thursday in the interests of the British Red Cross. It may be remembered that for the last two years the British Red Cross has appealed to Canada for aid. In 1915 Kentville organized and collected over \$500, in 1916 nothing was done but it is hoped that this year an amount equaling at least that collected in 1915 may be received. The citizens have no wish to be behind other towns in this regard and they have shown on other occasions when appeals have been explained and presented to them that they were generous and open handed. Fortunately no one requires to have the need of the Red Cross presented to them and the work of the Canadian Red Cross typifies the work of the British Red Cross. It must be remembered, however, that this campaign is for funds for the British Red Cross, the parent society, and nothing of the amount collected goes to the Canadian Red Cross. The British Red Cross ministers to the needs of soldiers in every theatre of the war and their activities are carried on wherever there is fighting. The expenditures is at the rate of \$16,000,000 a year and if this work is to continue on the same scale Canada must do its share. In the past three years it has given so generously that Sir Arthur Stanley, the President has said "If Canada fails us in October we must curtail many of our activities."

It is hoped that the citizens take more than a passive interest in this matter and help by their presence at the Mayor's meeting to effect an organization for conducting a campaign only by active interest and enthusiasm on the part of the townspeople can results be obtained.
