International Bible Lesson for Tomorrow—Joshua's Parting Advice—Josh. 24, 14-25.

Golden Text—"Choose ye this day whom ye will serve."

For 25 years this man of God, now 103 years old, a patriot, commander-in-chief and judge of all Israel, had led them in conquest and allotted and settled them in their locations. He calls a farewell meeting of the Tribes at Shechem to pledge them in fidelity to the God of Israel. The case is put to their choice, the candidates proposed for election—the Lord Jehovah or the gods of Egypt or Ammon. Some would think Jehovah's service hard, because the flesh was to be denied and a cross taken up, and idol worship easy, just as men do to-day. God calls for a service of sincerity and truth, for a national and individual choice, not because we can do no other, but because we do better. (Sincerely without the truth of God we are blind, superstitious fanatics. Witness our poor doughboys on the prairie in a blizzard, nearly naked and starved, seeking a Messiah, when he said, "As the lightning cometh forth from the east and is seen even unto the west, so shall be the coming of the Son of Man." Matt. 24, 27.) To help them to a right decision Joshua says, "The morning my house will serve the Lord, First himself. Some fathers act as if the service of wife and children, without theirs, was enough. Idols are the idols of their worshippers; our God-given ideal is Jesus Christ our Lord.

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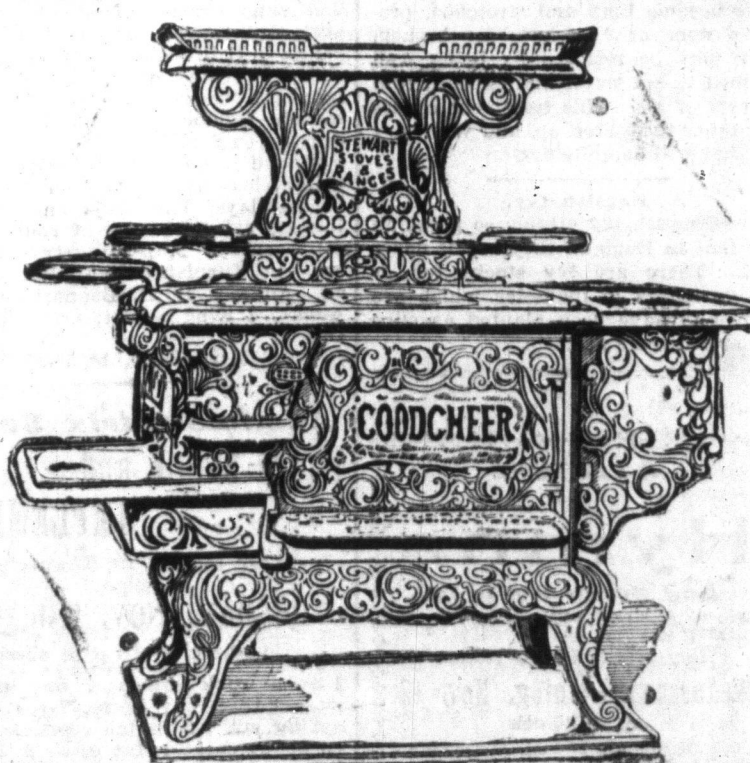
