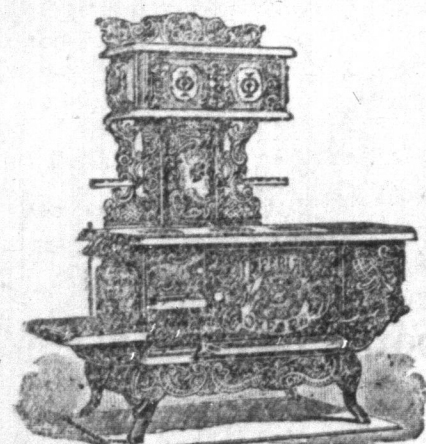

NO CHANGE

Board of Works has no intention of amending Street Paving Specifications.

The Board of Works met last evening. Ald. Mounter, Waddell, Marshall and City Engineer Jones were present.

Mr. Mounter said the scrapers were ordered out for Monday morning, but the rain prevented the streets being graded.

City Engineer Jones reported that brick were being hauled to fill in the hole on Head St. where all the accidents occurred on Monday. He also reported that the approach to the crossing on Victoria Ave. was being fixed.

The chairman of the Board of Works remarked with a smile that he guessed that the Board had no intention of changing the specifications, and the Board assented.

Ald. Mounter said that he had interviewed Sam. Glenn re the opening of the alleyway to the rear of the stores on King St. West. Mr. Glenn had said that after the remarks at the Council Board, he had withdrawn his offer and the right of way was not now for sale.

The city engineer was instructed to examine the crossing on William St. at Stankley Ave. and report it temporarily.

Ald. Mounter said that if the pavement went ahead that it would not be long before there was something better there.

The city engineer presented his estimate of the cost of the pavement on William St. across the creek. The amount was \$4,000.

Ald. Mounter said that he would favor advertising now for tenders even if the work didn't go on until spring.

Blight & Fielder offered to straighten the granite block in front of Alister McKay's residence for \$10. They, however, to get the work done and have the walk put in decent shape, offered to pay half. Mr. McKay said that \$10 was too much; that \$5 was plenty for the work. The Board decided to offer Mr. McKay \$5 and let him get the work done himself.
