MOORS' CAMP IS BURNED

Tribesmen Dispersed By Allied Franco-Spanish Army

Moors Routed At Point of Bayonet—Well Planned Attack

Casablanca, Sept. 13.—The allied Franco-Spanish army on Wednesday made a sudden and successful move on Taddert, where the Moors were massed in force.

The camp of the latter was destroyed by bombardment, and the enemy was put to flight, leaving many dead on the field. The French lost one man killed and six men wounded.

The attack was carefully planned, and was based largely on the observations of the Moors' position made from a military balloon.

The allied army, which was divided into two columns, left the camp at 6 o'clock in the morning, leaving several companies of infantry to defend the base at Casablanca.

The first column was composed of four companies of regular infantry, several companies of sharpshooters, a battery of artillery and all the cavalry.

The second consisted of six companies of infantry and a battery of artillery. The march was skillfully carried out under the cover of a fog until within half way to Taddert, where the fog lifted and disclosed several large bands of the enemy.

The allies then charged several large bands of the enemy at the point of the bayonet, and although the Moors resisted with their old-time courage they were finally compelled to retreat in the face of a superior force, and both of the columns of allied troops advanced on Taddert.

After the bombardment of that place by the French artillery, as well as by the guns of the French cruiser Gloire, which fired 75 shells, the allied infantry advanced a section of the Moors' camp, where the enemy was making a last desperate stand. A short engagement followed, and the Moors fled in wild disorder, pursued for several miles by the irregular Algerian cavalry in the French service. The Moorish camp was destroyed. The exact loss of the Moors is not known, as they carried away many of their dead.

The allied army later returned to Casablanca.

Reports a Victory.

During the engagement the Moors endeavored to employ their new tactics of circling rapidly in front of the advancing troops, with the object of cutting them off and surrounding a section of the allied forces, but the attempt utterly failed yesterday, largely on account of the rapid advance of the two independent columns, whose movements seemed to puzzle the Moors and made them believe that a trap was laid for them.

When assaulted from a long line of troops, the Moors retreated from Taddert, where many of them fell under the accurate firing of the field artillery and the guns of the Gloire, at anchor off the coast.

When the Moors saw their camp in flames, they set fire to all the farms and woods which they could reach, and soon the country surrounding Taddert became covered with smoke and flames.

Gen. Drude personally conducted the military operations.

Paris, Sept. 13.—The War Minister, Gen. Picquart, yesterday received the following despatch from Gen. Drude, commanding the French troops at Casablanca:

"I am pleased to notify you that, thanks to a land fog we have been able to surprise the Moroccan camp at Taddert, which was burned. The Moors were dispersed and fled to the hills, followed by the guns of our artillery, and effective projectiles from the Gloire. On our side one man was killed and six were wounded."

Get Away With \$100,000.

New Orleans, Sept. 13.—Charles E. Lotten, chief clerk in the office of the first district tax collector here, who disappeared two days ago, leaving a shortage of over \$100,000, was discovered yesterday afternoon standing on the banks of the Mississippi, attempting to summon up courage enough to jump in the water and commit suicide.

He said he had started toward the water several times, but each time his courage had failed him.

He made a full confession.

Hog Frightened Horse.

St. Vincent, Sept. 13.—Joseph Taylor, a farmer near Madrid, was putting his team in the stable about 6 o'clock when a hog ran into the stall where he was unharnessing a horse. The beast began to plunge and kick and knocked Mr. Taylor down, rendering him unconscious. When found both jaw bones were broken, as well as his nose, while his head and body were a mass of cuts and bruises. He lingered unconscious until Tuesday morning, when he died.

Striking Operator Arrested.

New Orleans, La., Sept. 13.—A. C. Tripp, a striking operator, was arrested Wednesday night on a charge of malicious mischief for interfering with the Associated Press leased wire.

He stepped up to a key which was not in use, opened it and stopped the report, while he called to the operators on the circuit and applied appropriate names to them. Tripp afterwards admitted that he had done this.

MODEL TREATY DRAFTED.

Italy and Argentina Will Submit to Three Arbitrators.

The Hague, Sept. 13.—Special care was taken in drafting the general arbitration treaty just concluded, in behalf of their respective Governments, by the Italian and Argentine delegates to the Peace Conference, in order that it may serve as a model for other treaties of like nature which Italy and Argentina expect to conclude with other countries.

By the terms of this treaty, the two countries interested agree to submit to arbitration all the differences which may arise between them, with the exception of those affecting provisions of the constitution or questions of nationality. In case of a conflict of views, each country will appoint an arbitrator, and they will appoint a third. In the event of the two countries being unable to agree on the appointment of a third arbitrator, the appointment will be made by the Queen of the Netherlands.

REVOLUTION FIGURES.

Number of Victims of "Dramatic Period" Fixed at 47,020.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 13.—The Slovo yesterday published statistics regarding the revolutionary movement, prepared by the noted Russian statistician, Dr. Zankoff, whereby the total number of victims of the "dramatic epidemic" is placed at 47,020, of which 19,144 were killed.

It is further shown that 2,381 sentences of death were carried out, that 1,380 prisoners committed suicide, and that 21,405 persons were wounded. The largest loss of life, 12,953, resulted from encounters with the soldiers or police.

The anti-Jewish riots numbered 7,992, and there were 4,540 anti-Armenian riots and 2,193 mutinies. The agrarian disorders were comparatively insignificant, only 539.

The revolutionists assassinated 39 generals or governors, 61 prefects and 8,079 officials of various ranks.
