THE GREAT TAKU GLACIER

The Great taku Glacier

There are many notable sights to be seen by the tourist who has the opportunity to visit Alaska, but none more impressive than the famous Taku Glacier, which lies between Wrangell and Juneau. This is one of the largest ice fields in the world, where the ice breaks off in great bergs that fall into the sea with a roar like a peal of thunder. The glacier is one mile wide and from there it extends ninety miles back into the heart of the mountains that girdle this rich and beautiful land. It is one of the few great advancing glaciers left in North America and it is a sight which impresses itself deeply upon those who are privileged to view it. That number will be greatly increased by the inauguration of a steamship service by the Canadian National Railways from Vancouver and Prince Rupert as far north as Skagway, Alaska, with ports of call en route at Ketchikan, a typical Alaskan town built at the foot of the mountains; Wrangell, a city where bejewelled ladies of the Russian Court danced in rustling silks when other belles were threading the mazes of the minuet in towns on the Atlantic Coast; Juneau, the modern and attractive capital of this northern outpost of the United States, and Skagway, the portal to the famous White Horse Pass, whose name is linked forever with the great gold-rushes where men gambled their lives for the sake of hidden gold.
