CARL SCHURZ PASSES AWAY; A MAN WITH A ROMANTIC CAREER

Took Active Part in the Revolutionary Move ment in Germany in 1849.

Had Marvellous Escape from Capture and ...dd to Flee the Country.

Took Part in U. S. Civil War and Was a Member of President Hay's Cabinet.



New York, May 14 .- Carl Schurz, wide. 1852, was an indirect outgrowth of the sensational rescue of his friend from pri-

ly known as a publicist and former Cab-inet member, died at his home in this city at 4.35 o'clock this morning. Death was due to a complication of diseases. following an attack of stomach trouble, which became acute on Thursday last. In spite of brief periods of seeming improvement, Mr. Schurz slowly failed, and yesterday afternoon sank into a state of ma, which continued until the end. Forced to flee from the land of his

Forced to flee from the land of his birth before he had attained his major-ity, Mr. Schurz soon become, and ior more than half a century remained, one of the striking figures in the public life of the land of his adoption. He was born in the village of Liblar, near Co-logne, in 1829, and became interested in the revolutionary movement in Germany while attending the University of Bonn. When the uprising came in 1849 he serv-ed as a private in the ranks of the insur-gents. He was with General Tideman when the latter surrendered the fortress of Rastadt in july of that year, and made an almost miraculous escape through the sewer connecting with the Rhine, and field to Switzerland. A year later he returned to Germany, under an assumed name, for the purpose of liberating his friend, Prof. Kinket, who had been taken a prisoner at the surrendere of the fort-

He went to Spain as United States Minister in 1861, later resigning to re-turn and serve in the civil war, during which he earned the title of Major-Gen-eral. In 1877 he became Secretary of the In-terior in the Cabinet of cresident Hayes. During his tenure of office Mr. Schurz effected wide reforms in the administra-tion of the Department. 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


