SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST LAND REGULATIONS

THE sole head of a family, or an male over 18 years old may stead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant mus appear in person at the Do Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency not Sub-Agency), on certain

Duties-Six months residence upo and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live nine miles of his homestead certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his home

Price \$3.00 per acre. -Six months residence each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchas ed homestead in certain districts.

Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.
