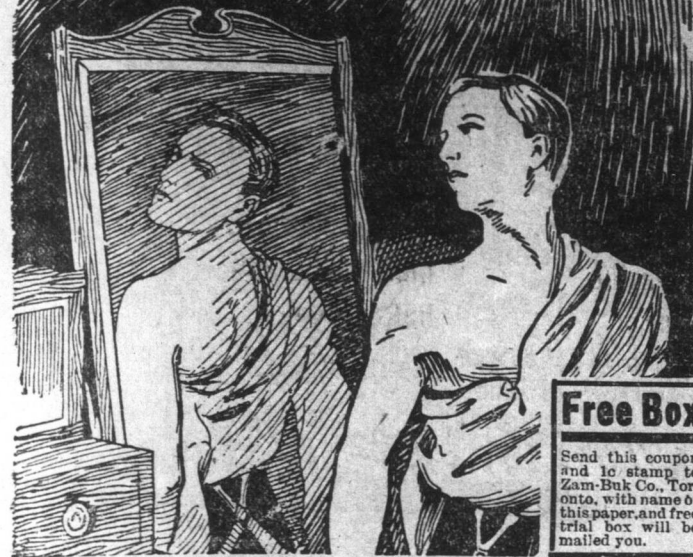

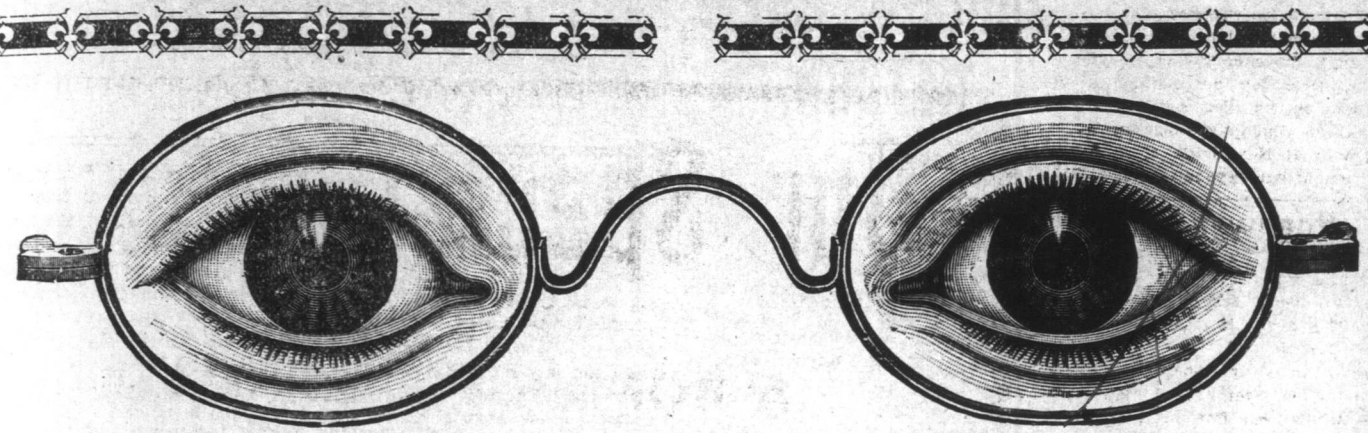

## Looking for Bank Manager.

He is also an ex-member of the Provincial Legislature, and a few years ago made a good fight for election as Mayor of Toronto. He is described in the circular as being about 45 years old, corpulent, clean shaven, height 5 feet 8 inches, and weighing 270 lbs. The police having his description will keep a look out for him.

## Special Meeting.

A special meeting of the City Council was held last night to discuss the question of the cleaning up the streets of the city. On motion of Councillor Mullaly it was decided to begin a regular systematized attempt to-day. A gang of men was ordered to clear the ice and snow off Water Street first, then go to Duckworth St., New Government Street, etc. A motion was made by one of the Councillors to increase the salary of the West End Park Keeper. Councillor Mullaly strongly opposed this, and would not be a party to "allowing the thin edge of the wedge to be driven in order to get increases for certain officials, friends of certain Councillors." The proposal was then dropped.

## Excellent Exhibits.

By the Tobacco, which sails for England this evening, Mr. John Clouston is sending forward a large consignment of the fish products which has made his name famous throughout Newfoundland. These consist of the various brands of boneless and shredded cod, codfish meal, cod liver and cod oil, glue and other by-products of the cod, with fish skin, &c. The samples of his industry and ingenuity are placed in nice handy packages, neatly labelled and fitted with glass covers, which enable those who inspect them to see the contents at a glance. These exhibits of our principal industry go forward to the Festival of Empire to be held at the Crystal Palace, London, in June next. We believe Mr. Clouston's handwork will receive the attention and praise of all who go to the Festival.

## C.E.T.S. Meeting.

The C. E. T. S. had a very successful meeting in the Synod Building last night. An address on the 20th Century Prodigal Son was beautifully illustrated by lantern slides, showing the gradual downfall of the young man led astray by the love of a life of debauchery. The lecturer made it clear that the most prevalent sin in the city was intemperance, which had wrecked the lives of many promising young men. He referred to the curtailing of the liquor traffic by early closing. Money was too often spent on alcohol that should be spent on food and clothing. The death rate amongst infants is largely due to intemperance. Mr. H. J. Earle, of Pogo accompanied the hymns on the piano. Two young men signed the pledge.

## A Pitiable Case.

By the express yesterday Sgt. Cram brought here a man named Thomas Hardy, a resident of Rose Blanche, aged 50 years. The man who has been fishing from that place all the winter is in a bad state, and recently was afflicted with chills in his leg and arms, and became insane as a result. The hardships incidental to fishing in an open boat during the cold winter months and lack of good nourishing food brought this about. He was attended by Dr. Grant, and so badly chilled is his blood that needles were inserted in his arms and legs but he felt no sensation. If it is to recover, he will require the best possible treatment.

## Work at Bell Island.

Work is beginning to look up again at Bell Island, and in a few weeks the average number of men will have been taken on. There is a very large quantity of ore on the surface and the stock pile ready for shipment. Several large steamers have been chartered for freighting the ore this coming season. The output is expected to exceed that of last year. The first shipments will be made about the middle of April by the N. S. Co.

## Captured by Citizen.

Yesterday evening a man who it was thought was a passenger on the Monaghan, entered Mr. James Dobbin's saloon, on Water Street, and as he was under the influence of liquor Mr. Dobbin very properly refused him drink. He then became nasty and in going out the door beat in the glass with his fists. He then ran away, but was followed by Mr. Andrew McElroy of the Star Football team, who captured and threw him and ran him to the police station with Sgt. Byrne.

## Bonaventure's Turn Out of Fat.

The turn out of the Bonaventure was figured up at Job Bros. office yesterday afternoon. It was as follows:—16,659 young harps, 4,998 young hoods, 574 old harps, 4,058 old hoods. Total 26,289 seals. Gross weight: 646 tons, 10 cwt., 1 qr., 21 lbs.; nett: 590 tons, 9 cwt., 2 qrs., 14 lbs. Gross value, \$46,827.31; nett value, \$46,287.31. The average weight of young harps was 33½ lbs.; young hoods, 42-45 lbs.; old harps, 109½ lbs.; old hoods, 151½ lbs. Her crew of 269 men shared \$57.14 each.

## Irish Emigration.

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, To-day. The Irish Emigration Statistics of 1910 go to show that the various Land Purchase and Laborers' Act and the prophecies of Home Rule are not sufficient to keep Young Ireland at home. In 1910 there left Ireland 32,923 people, an increase of 3,693 over the number of emigrants in 1909. The number of Irish emigrants who have left Irish ports since January 1851, including 1910, is 4,187,443.

## Rev. G. R. Godden, M.A.

UNANIMOUSLY NOMINATED AS RECTOR OF ST. THOMAS'S CHURCH.

Last night a large gathering of the parishioners of St. Thomas's Church was held in Canon Wood Hall for the purpose of nominating a successor to the late Canon Dunfield. The People's Warden, Mr. R. F. Goodridge, occupied the chair, and opened proceedings by reading the rules of the Synod which govern the nomination of a Rector.

Hon. R. Watson rose to submit a resolution recording the great loss sustained by the Parish in the demise of Canon Dunfield, and expressing the deep sympathy of the congregation with Mrs. Dunfield and her bereaved family. Fourteen years ago he (Mr. W.) had presided as Churchwarden over the meeting at which Rev. Mr. Dunfield was nominated as the successor of the saintly Canon Wood, and now every one would admit that Canon Dunfield had sustained the best traditions of the parish. He was a preacher of exceptional ability, gifted with powers of organization, possessed of much tact, and calm that endeared him to the whole congregation. His loss would be felt not only by the Parish but by the whole Diocese. They shared with Mrs. Dunfield in their sorrow, and to her and her family he felt it would be a consolation to place on record their feelings of sorrow. He begged to propose the adoption of the following resolution:

"The congregation of St. Thomas's Church wish to express their deep sympathy with the widow and family of their beloved Rector. They desire at the same time to record the deep sense of personal loss which every member of his flock feels by the death of a revered pastor. In the many years during which the late Canon Dunfield ministered to them in spiritual things, they have always felt that his life and ministry were marked by devotion to duty, and graced with every Christian virtue."

Mr. J. A. Clift, K.C., seconded the resolution, and in doing so paid a warm tribute to the late Canon for the affection he had won and the esteem he had gained among the parishioners. Canon Dunfield was in every respect a faithful Rector of the Parish.

Mr. A. J. Harvey supported the resolution as a life-long friend of Canon Dunfield.

The resolution was carried by acclamation and the Chairman stated that he would forward a copy to Mrs. Dunfield.

Mr. H. W. LeMessurier made a motion for the appointment of a committee to consider the best means of perpetuating the memory of the late Rector, and to report at the Easter meeting. This motion was seconded by Mr. Woodley, supported by Sir James Winter and carried.

The following will form the committee: Hon. M. G. Winter and Mr. R. F. Goodridge, Churchwardens; Sir J. S. Winter, Hon. R. Watson, Messrs. A. J. Harvey, H. W. LeMessurier, J. A. Clift and J. Williams.

The Chairman then read correspondence which had passed between the Churchwardens and the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Synod in reference to the vacancy in the rectorship. Then Mr. A. J. Harvey made the following motion:

"That a vacancy having been occasioned in the office of Rector of St. Thomas's Church by the death of the Reverend Canon Dunfield, this meeting duly convened and representing the said Parish, hereby nominates the Reverend George Ross Godden, M.A., for appointment and induction by the Lord Bishop of Newfoundland as Rector of the said Parish, in succession to the late Canon Dunfield, in accordance with the Act of the Synod of the Church of England of this Diocese, in such case provided."

In moving the resolution he said there was nothing truer than that "God buries His workmen but carries on His work." Mr. Godden had served for over thirteen years as Senior Curate of the Parish, and had endeared himself to all the parishioners. His opinion was that they could not do better than follow the last precedent, nominate the Senior Curate. He had much pleasure in nominating Mr. Godden as Rector.

Mr. John Williams seconded the motion, which was put by the Chairman and carried without a dissenting voice. The result was received with great acclamation, which testified to the popularity of the Rector-elect.

The Chairman will convey the sense of the meeting to the Bishop's Commissary, Rev. Canon Tompkins, and as soon as the ratification of the Bishop has been received, Mr. Godden will be inducted as Rector.

The Evening Telegram concurs in the congratulations which are now pouring on Mr. Godden. The work Mr. Godden has done in the past affords ample testimony of his fitness for his new duties, and we believe in the broader field which is now open to the new gentleman he will justify the confidence which has been unanimously reposed in him.
