A man who has sustained such a the blood which had soaked his pants urgently, surgical attention. On the other hand the Superintendent of an hospital is the guardian of the life and health of those who are already in the hospital, and it is his duty to protect them. In their interest Dr Keegan declares that he refused admission to Roach, and that his action was justified by what took place in the ward after his decision was overridden and Roach was admitted. It is very clear Roach could not be allowed to remain in the state he was, in great agony, and with a possibility of bleeding to death. If there s no accommodation for such cases vision is made either at the General Hospital or elsewhere. Dr. Keegan is of opinion that an accident ward should be provided at one of the police stations, where appliances and what is needed could be kept, and a police surgeon immediately summon ed, or if that is not found feasible that a casual accident ward should erected at the General Hospital. If Dr. Keegan is right to refuse such case under such circumstances providing a casuality infirmary. Nothing can justify the absence of accommodation and means of treating immediately such serious cases. A man must not be left in agony and bleeding to death because he is drunk and noisy; nor must other patients be imperilled by uproars in a hospital ward. It is up to the Government to take up the matter and see that accommodation and attendance are provided for such cases of acci-


