Badly Taken In.

Four and half years ago the whole of the industrial classes of the Colony—the Fishermen, the Farmers, the Mechanics, the Labourers, the Clerks, and all who work for a living, in the words of Sir Edward Morris were told they would find a rallying point, under the banner of the People's Party, where all who wish to see their country advance might join together to work for the common good. Those who did rally to the cry have been grievously disappointed and badly taken in, and very many of them are now in open revolt against the People's Party and anxious for a chance to turn that party out. It is a notorious fact that a large number of fishermen are organized and waiting for an opportunity to strike a mortal blow to the People's Party, large numbers of whom helped to put the Morris and Morrison Combine in power. They have now found out their mistake. They have discovered that they have government whose work does not tend to the common good. They have seen members of the Government party obtaining rights to cut timber over enormous areas of Crown Lands. They find brothers and relatives and partners of Ministers figure largely among these beneficiaries. The Governor has been staggered at the conduct of a chief member of his Ministry and all who work for a living have been shocked by the fact that Sir Edward Morris defended the conduct of the Hon. Donald Morrison, and have been positively astounded to find the eight colleagues of the Hon. Donald Morrison still sitting with him in the Executive Council.

The Fishermen, the Farmers, the Mechanics, the Clerks, and all who work for a living—to whom Sir Edward Morris made his special appeal—find that they have not obtained in the mis-called People's Party, the business government they were promised. They find a marked absence of economy and care in the administration of public affairs. They found that the Railway Extension Contract was entered upon without the exercise of common care and prudence. The contract was signed, sealed and delivered and endorsed in the Legislature by the party professing business principles before they had counted the cost or knew well what they were about. After leading the country to believe in 1910 that the Loan of that year would pay for the absolute completion of the work contracted for and be the only burden the country would

A Schooner Lost.

Jubilee Hotel and all its Contents—With Four Houses Destroyed—Settlement as Well as Railway Station and Post Office in Danger.

At 5 o'clock last evening a destructive fire broke out at Norris' Arm and for a while the whole settlement was in danger. The glass in the windows of the Post Office near as well as those of the Railway Station, melted in some cases and was cracked in others and but for the good work of the railway section men and residents of the place the settlement would have been wiped out. The Reid N&D Co. kindly supplied the "Telegram" with the information they had in the matter. About 8 p.m. a large brick house opposite the station in which there was found to be on fire. The flames had gained full control of the structure when the discovery was made and soon all the section men and residents of the Arm were on the scene but the heat was so intense that their efforts to check the spread of the fire were futile and they were obliged to be driven back. The fire then communicated itself to the Jubilee Hotel, a large structure owned by the Central Forestry Company and in which there were several boarders. The section men now formed a bucket brigade with the residents and worked hard and earnestly to save the building by throwing water on it taken from neighboring wells but in vain. The flames soon enveloped the structure and the heat gradually drove the men back and in about 2 hours the fabric was a mass of ruins. Four other small houses caught and were also demolished quickly. The men now turned their attention to saving the Post Office and Station and by deluging these places they eventually and after a strenuous fight managed to save them. Had these taken fire there was every possibility of the whole settlement or at least the greater part of it being wiped out. All the furniture in the Jubilee Hotel was destroyed and we learn there was no insurance on the building or contents. The loss to the company owning the Hotel will be several thousands of dollars. The express which arrived to-day was there for a while and the train hands say the conflagration lit up the landscape for miles around. How the fire originated is not known.

By the Schr. Lusita which arrived here yesterday, from Twillingate, we learn that the schr. Nina Pearl, owned by Ambrose Payne of Foxe, was lost near Piller's Island, Monday night while running in the Bay to take a lumber cargo. It was very thick and stormy with a gale of S. wind and heavy sea running when she struck and was badly smashed by the sea. Her crew of 5 men, including Skipper Payne, took to the boat and at the risk of their lives managed to get ashore but lost all their belongings. The vessel was 30 tons burden and was insured in the Twillingate scheme.

Vessel's Narrow Escape.

The Horwood Co's fine new schr. Arthur H. Wright arrived here last evening from Long Bay, with 2500 feet of lumber. At 2 a.m. Thursday a gale sprang up from the S. with heavy rain and the vessel was moored in the pier in very shallow water. A tremendous sea ran and she would have pounded to pieces but that the crew worked so hard. She is a vessel of 120 tons and there were only 5 men on board, yet they labored so earnestly and persisted that they eventually worked her into deep water and with 2 anchors down rode out the gale.

Marine Notes.

The Poroga left Joe Batt's Arm at 9:10 a.m. to-day bound north. The schr. Ionia, Capt. Goddard, arrived at Oporto from Berlin yesterday after a good passage. The Dunure sailed to-day for Lohis with 2371 qts. fish shipped by Bowring Bros. The of her crew deserted yesterday but were captured by the police and put on board this morning. Whitley's schooner Purita arrived here this forenoon from Bonn's Cape. She has 1,499 qts. of fish on board and brought up some of the crews who were fishing in the Straits. This afternoon Hon. E. R. Bowring, J. S. Munn, Esq., Mayor Ellis and the councillors, the members for St. John's East and West and several others visited the Island to see the improvements being effected in the Bowring Park. Some 70 men are at work there under the supervision of Mr. Cochran who is an artist in his profession.

WASHINGTON To-day.

As long as Britain and the States stand together in friendship they will dominate the world, Sir George Reid, High Commissioner of Australia, is quoted as saying in an interview published here to-day. Should a rupture occur the outlook would be difficult and other Powers might seek to change the balance of the world. Happily there is no indication that such a rupture will occur. Sir George spoke reservedly of the Panama Canal. He declared that Britain would not begrudge the States any recompense from the Canal, but he thought the American people should observe every treaty right to which they were pledged.
