Special Evening Telegram.
TOULON, Feb. 19.
Three French Naval gunners were killed, and many others injured on board the Dreadnought Danton, during target practice, yesterday.

ST. JOHN, Feb. 19.
The C.P.R. steamer Montfort, Capt. Davidson, from Antwerp, has arrived here after a very stormy voyage. There were 253 passengers, foreigners, bound west. She left Antwerp, January 25th. On February the 5th, the propeller broke, and a heavy sea carried away the deck house. Capt. Davidson's conduct was most praiseworthy, and public recognition is possible.

ST. PETERSBURG, Feb. 19.
The dispute between Bulgaria and Roumania over the cession of a strip of territory by the former to the latter, on the Black Sea Coast, brought about a panic on the Bourse to-day. While public opinion is greatly excited, the Russian Government keeps hopeful, declaring its confidence that joint action by the Powers, resulting possibly in mediation by Russia and Italy, will assure a settlement and avert armed occupation by Roumania. Russia, however, has decided to follow the example of Germany, Austria and France in increasing the peace footing of her Army.

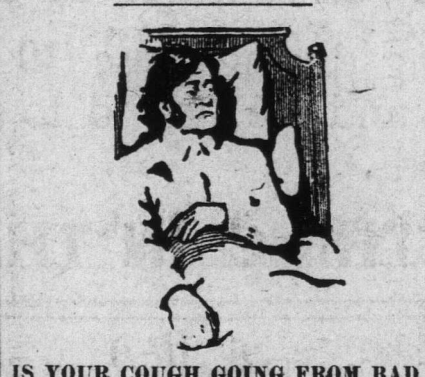
MEXICO CITY, Feb. 19.
President Madero was arrested in the National Palace to-day, by General Blanquet, and Gustavo Madero, the President's brother, was arrested at the same time by General Huerta. The military commander of the Federal troops, who was later proclaimed President, after a conference between representatives of Huerta and Diaz, while Madero and the other members of his family were under arrest in the Palace. The crowds running about the streets now are crying, "Vivas for Huerta and Diaz." All the members of the Cabinet, except Ernest Madero, the President's uncle, have also been arrested. He escaped. Blanquet told his men the "time had come when some drastic means must be taken to stop a conflict in which fathers were killing their sons, and brothers were fighting one another; when non-combatants were sharing the fate of war, and all this because of the caprice of one man." Blanquet long lukewarm in Madero's support, has a son with Diaz.

Benediction of the Most Blessed Sacrament was imposed while the Tantum Ergo and O Salutaris were rendered exceptionally well by the boys choir of the Christian Brothers Schools. Before the close the Papal Blessing was administered to all present.

The New Soprano.

Yorkshire Mill Girl of Sixteen With A Glorious Voice.

There is always something romantic about the humble origin of great artists, and some of music's greatest devotees have sprung from obscurity. Kubelik is the son of a market gardener, and more recently Mme. Arius, who was recently working with her father and mother at Brook's cotton mills, Huddersfield. Miss Watson, who is only sixteen, has been devoted to music from her earliest childhood, and for the past three years has been able to sandwich a few lessons between her work-hours at the mill. These she largely owes to Mme. Rina Robinson, of the Huddersfield College of Music, who was struck by the beauty of her voice - a clear soprano of particularly high compass. She has now won a scholarship at the Royal Academy of Music open to all England, and her future should be a brilliant one.

Swallowed 1,000 Pins

Death of a Remarkable Young Woman at Hamilton.

Hamilton, Ont., Feb. 8.—One of the most remarkable patients who ever entered the local hospital, is dead in the person of Nellie Morden, aged twenty years. She was admitted three or four weeks ago and was suffering from having swallowed pins. An X-ray photograph was taken of her stomach, and it is estimated that there were a thousand pins in it. They were to be seen in the photograph in great masses, and included not only ordinary pins, but small brooches and similar articles, and the doctors could do little for her because of the length of time her pin swallowing operations covered, as they had greatly torn the stomach.

Pancakes.

The pancake is a small, round object which is served early in the day so that people can recover from the effects before dinner. It is frequently prescribed by unscrupulous physicians who wish to increase their practice, and who use it to test the durability of the digestive apparatus.

Pancakes were never heard of in this country until the Pilgrim Fathers headed in off Plymouth Rock and began to look around for a place to hold a protracted meeting. The Indians didn't use pancakes in any form, and history tells us that they never had any stomach trouble until they made its acquaintance. The first thing the Pilgrim Fathers did after they landed was to prepare a large batch of pancakes and chloroform several robust Indians with them. This was the real cause of the first scalping party held for the benefit of our Puritan ancestors.

The hotel pancake is a deadly weapon which is about as hard to digest as a ten-penny nail. Nobody has ever discovered the ingredients of this article, which is always covered with a plate so that the recipient will not become discouraged and leave the table.

Some hotels advertise that they put a buckwheat filling in their pancakes, but as buckwheat is not used in making sole leather few people believe it.

The best pancake is that which is made at home from materials which can be studied at close range. After a woman has stood over a hot stove and flipped pancakes for a double-chinned husband and seven avaricious sons, she will not care whether they have liver or pineapple ice for lunch. Mother always gets to breakfast just in time to see the last pancake disappear with a melodious gulp.

Pancakes are usually served in company with pure Vermont maple syrup, which tastes so much like brown-sugar and New Orleans sorghum that people look it sternly in the eye while pouring it. The maple syrup used at restaurants and railroad eating houses is always carefully diluted with flies and other debris before serving.
