The predictions made by certain Unionists that its final adoption by the Commons would be followed by a fierce outourst in Ulster and sanguinary conflicts between Orangemen and Nationists have proved to be untrue. Up to the present, Belfast is as quiet as well ordered sewing meeting, is the admission of one Unionist newspaper. 
