



The Hague, Feb. 11, via London-Dr. Henry Van Dyke, the United States Minister to The Hague, and also to the Grand Duchy of Luxemburg, said to-day that he had appealed to the Government at Washington to protest against German interference with his duties as Minister to Luxemburg. He said his diplomatic communications with Luxemburg have been cut off by the German military commander at Trier (Treves), who had refused to permit his letters to pass, because they were sealed with the seal of the

American legation. Dr. Van Dyke said to-day: "I cannot consent to interference with my duties toward Luxemburg by any power, except that which conferred them upon me, namely, the Government at Washington."
