Napoleon Was Offered An Air Service.

The great progress made in aviation during the last few years recalls the fact that as long ago as in 1796 a Frenchman named Campanes drew up plans, which he laid before Napoleon, for the making of an aerial ship to accommodate 200 persons, and which he claimed could be directed to any point of the compass.

The inventor's letter deserves reproduction: "I myself will be your pilot. You can thus, without any danger hover above the fleets of enemies, jealous of our happiness, and thunder against them like a new Jupiter, by throwing perpendicular downwards firebrands made of a substance which will kindle only by the contact and percussion at the end of its fall, but which will be impossible to extinguish. Or, perhaps, you will think it more prudent to begin at once by forcing the British Cabinet to capitulate, which you may easily do as you have it in your power to set fire to the city of London, or to any of the maritime towns of England."

Campanes assured Napoleon his airship could travel from Paris to London, destroy the place, and return to Paris within twenty-four hours.

Napoleon refused to countenance the scheme, however. And it is interesting to note in this regard, that in the early days of the war aeroplanes were used, both by the Allies and the enemy solely for scouting purposes, and the pilots of both sides exchanged greetings when they passed each other. It was not until a German pilot shot at a British that each side took to arming their own aircraft, and battles in the air became inevitable.



Spends Half Hour Among the Babies.

Toronto, August 26.—Babies were the chief interest of the Prince of Wales when he visited the Toronto General Hospital to-day. The tinner the babies, the great was his interest. Time limitations and other engagements went by the board when His Royal Highness looked at the little kiddies. Sir Joseph Flavell, chairman of the board of governors of the hospital who was escorting the Prince, looked at his watch after the heir to the throne had spent his allotted twenty minutes in the institution. Sir Joseph feared that the time was up and gently intimated that fact. But someone had mentioned to the Prince that he had not yet seen the "babies under glass." The little ones prematurely born and being nursed and brought up to normal health and strength by the incubator process. That settled it.

"We have time enough for this and," said the Prince, "at least we'll take time."

The Prince was much interested in a two-pound mite of an infant and learned that it had a good chance of growing into full manhood. The Prince also visited the hospital for sick children, a visit which had not been programmed or announced. There was a pleasing incident in the hospital for sick children. It seems that the Prince had purchased a lot of toys and sent them to the boys in the wards. The little lads were all standing at attention when the Prince entered, and broke out in a chorus of "thank you so much for the toys." Then the Prince seemed to blush a bit under the ruddiness of his cheeks and he replied that he was glad the toys had pleased them.

A New Medical Discovery (?)

Influenza and pneumonia are no more to be feared than a boil on the back of the neck, according to Dr. Charles H. Duncan, one of the founders of the Volunteer Hospital, who, in an address in New York recently before the convention of the Allied Medical Association of America described his method of combating Spanish Influenza by means of "immunizing a patient to his own poison." Upon 246 patients, ill with pneumonia and influenza last winter, Dr. Duncan said he had used the treatment without a single fatality or any complications. Briefly the physician said, "I take one drachm of mucus from the infected area and pasteurize it in one ounce of filtered water, where it remains several hours. One cubic centimetre of this toxine, injected sub-cutaneously, will effect a spontaneous cure of Spanish influenza, pneumonia, catarrh, or any similar localized infection. It will stop any cough except tuberculosis in less than 24 hours." Dr. George F. Laidlow, professor of the History of Medicine and Diagnosis at Flower Hospital, in discussing the Duncan Method, said that "the discoverer had solved a problem that had been germinating in medicine for 2,000 years. Dr. Duncan's work marks the conclusion of Pasteur, Koch and Wright and is a decided step forward in the regular development of bacterial therapy."

Dr. Duncan said that by taking the poison from a boil and subjecting it to his process and injecting the sterilized product into a patient's body, he not only cured him of the boil but rendered him immune against a repetition of such afflictions.
