At the City Hall.

The regular weekly meeting of the Municipal Council was held on Thursday. The Mayor presided and there were present Councillors Ayre, Mulhally and Martin.

After the opening business of the meeting, it was ordered that in the case of owners of new cars, who wanted registration during the past month, the following should be their obligation—Dating from the 1st of March, last, owners of new motor cars, shall be allowed to pay one fourth of the annual Tax, and shall be liable for the full annual Tax on June 1st. Arising out of this, it is proposed for next year, that registration for cars shall be on the 1st of April instead of on 1st of June.

The Eastern Trust Co. made application for the street line of Rosier's lane. Referred to the City Engineer.

The matter of the claims for sewerage construction and repairs, against Robinson and Co., Ltd., and Dr. Rendell, it was ordered, that without prejudice half the cost be accepted.

W. W. Blackall, for the Engineering School, asked for a service pipe for the next six or seven months. It will be given, provided an iron pipe is put down at his expense for the summer months only, with the clear understanding there is to be no waste.

A letter was read from the Public Works Department in connection with the removal of ashes from the various public buildings. It was shown on inquiry that quite an accumulation of ashes had taken place at some of these institutions. It was also discovered that \$15.00 per annum for the removal of ashes is too little. The charge, henceforth, will be \$35.00. The Dept. will be treated with on this basis as soon as they have removed the accumulation.

A. W. O'Reilly applied for repairs to be done to the breastwork near his residence, Water Street West. Decided to ask him for original lease and title deeds of ground, and the Solicitor to look up the question of grants in these cases.

J. T. Lamb and W. G. Randall sent in protests against a permit being given to L. M. Trask to install an electric motor. Ordered Mr. Trask be informed the neighbours are objecting and ask him to reconsider his application.

Robert Tucker, 100 Quidi Vidi Rd., wanted to know at what price a house could be built for him. Application left on file.

The following plans were approved: Union Publishing Co., for extension and garage near "Advocate" office; Albert Faulkner, LeMarchant Rd., provided he pays for sewer; Chas. Eddy, garage Prince of Wales Street; E. D. Morrissey, dwelling house.

The following permits were allowed: Geo. Tucker, build scaffold LeMarchant Rd.; E. T. Snow, to repair fence Cook Street; C. A. Pippy's proposed site for garage top of Springdale Street is to be inquired into.

W. T. Penney's letter re taking of land Merrymeeting Rd., is also to be inquired into. Geo. Skiffington's plans for houses Franklin Ave., were deferred, as he must show exact location of proposed dwellings. E. J. Woodland's plans for alterations to Shortall's Drug Store were not satisfactory; he must see the City Engineer. F. Kelley, South Side must submit proper plan.

On the report of the City Engineer the following was ordered:—He is to (1) give fuller report on land near Simms' property King's Bridge, (2) King's Bridge decking to be done, (3) Bannerman Park gates and fence to be repaired, (4) light to be placed corner of Power St., to suit application for one near Wesley Church, (5) a report to be made on water and sewerage for Clifford and Central Streets, (6) garage and dwelling can be built, Macklin Place, provided structures are raised four feet above present line and kept back.

Reports were read from the Plumbing Inspector, Impounder and Health Officer.

In the matter of Cab Taxes, it was ordered that the Solicitor be instructed to summon on the 1st of May, one from each cab-stand.

Ordered that tenders be asked for uniforms for the Inspectors.

The Reid Mfd. Co. are to be notified their sprinkler will not be required this season.

After the disposing of several minor matters, the meeting adjourned.
