Legislative Council.

House met at 4 p.m. yesterday. The Profiteering and Encouragement of Agriculture Bills were read and passed.

Exportation of Codfish, Beaver, and to cut Hard Woods and Foreign Aliens Bills were deferred.

The Masters and Mates Bill was referred to a select committee consisting of Hons. W. B. Grieve, M. G. G. Shea and F. H. Steer.

Debutante Dances, Business Tax, Ejectment of Tenants, and Company and Postal Telegraph were read a second time.

Act respecting tenancies and amendment thereof will now apply April 1st of next year, and in the interim it will be illegal to raise a rent.

Hon. Mr. Anderson, in reference to the coal question, repeated his statement of the previous day, that by buying in large quantities the price can be sold here at from \$13.00 to \$15.00 per ton.

Hon. Mr. Bishop retorted that Mr. Anderson's statements were wrong, and offered to put it to him at any time he chose.

Dealing with the Masters and Mates Bill, Hon. Mr. Bishop felt it would be of no value as it stands, because the commission at present cannot act, one after being away, and captains will have the chance of being examined if they are at the end of the year.

He had every confidence in the members of the commission, the absence of any one of them prevented examinations. Sir P. T. McGrath asked that the Bill be sent to a select committee, and suggested that the regulations of examinations by the commission should be approved by some other authority.

Hon. Shea, who moved the Bill, raised objection, and the select committee mentioned above was appointed.

In discussing the Profits Tax Hon. P. T. McGrath enquired as to move by the British Government to reduce the double tax on Securities held in England and the Dominion and as to what our representatives

had learned of the matter. Hon. Mr. Gibbs promised to secure the desired information.

At 6.30 the House adjourned till 4 o'clock to-morrow.
